

Filming detours buses

Scheduled closure of 11th Avenue, between Alder Avenue and Hilyard Avenue, to allow producers of the movie "Animal House" to film on that street, will interrupt service slightly on seven Lane Transit District bus routes.

Detour for inbound buses from Springfield, #10, 20, 5A, 5B and 6 will be "Franklin, left on Patterson, right on 11th, resume regular routes." Outbound service on these routes will not be interrupted.

University riders coming from Springfield will find a temporary bus stop at Franklin Avenue and Onyx Avenue; the 13th Street and Kincaid Avenue stop will not be in use for inbound buses during the detours.

Detour for inbound #11 buses from LCC will be "Hilyard, left on 11th Street, resume regular route." Outbound service will not be interrupted on this route either.

Detour on inbound and outbound #12 buses to the University will be #13th, left on Hilyard, left on 11th, resume regular route."

The schedule of classes will be published in the Register-Guard television section Saturday and in the Sunday edition. Registration will be Oct. 31 and Nov. 1 from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the Admissions Office of the LCC Center Building.

The schedule includes 33 business classes, one racquetball class, two human development courses, five language arts classes, 50 mathematics classes and five science courses.

Orienteering club meets

A sport that is gaining popularity in the U.S. is now organized at the University and the public is invited to participate.

The Orienteering Club meets Thursdays at 4 p.m. at the ROTC building, 1679 Agate St., but membership is not limited to those able to attend. The club has members from all over the state who participate in orienteering events held during the year in various parts of the West.

Orienteering, long practiced competitively in Europe and now gaining popularity in the U.S., is land navigation by means of map and compass. In competitive form it becomes a timed cross-country race combining the skills of hiking, running and land navigation on a pre-set course.

Phil Richey, club adviser, calls it "a thinking sport — you have to know where you are and where you are going."

Richey says the club is open to members of all ages and offers a teaching program for those who are not yet proficient with map and compass.

The club sponsors one regional competition each year, and enters several other meets each spring and fall. Practice and teaching sessions are held regularly. Annual dues are \$2.
