Be sure to reset clocks

If the Royal Observatory at Greenwich, England had never appropriated for its own the prime meridian 0 degrees and established a workable system for measuring solar time around the world; if Standard Time had not been established in 1884 and if Congress had not passed the Uniform Time Act of 1966, we would not now have to be reminded it's almost time to "fall back" an hour.

Sunday at 2 a.m. is the precise time at which this country stops observing the Daylight Saving Time we've been using since April 24.

In the spring, clocks are set ahead one hour to permit commercial and personal use of an extra daylight hour during the long days of summer. Therefore, we "spring ahead, fall back."

Arts, a health hazard?

The Oregon Lung Association (OLA) will present a "Health Hazards in the Visual Arts & Crafts" conference, Saturday in the Smith Center at Portland State University.

The conference is the first of its kind in Oregon to instruct artists and craftspersons of the health hazards confronting them.

According to Mary Ann Marten, OLA coordinator for the project, subject areas will include media workshops of ceramics, textiles, photography, printmaking/painting and sculpture.

Featured speaker for the one-day conference will be Gail Barazani, research assistant in environmental and occupational medicine from the University of Illinois School of Public Health. The remainder of the faculty will be environmental and occupational physicians, nurses, hygienists and specialists in the arts and crafts field from Oregon.

The conference is funded in part by Christmas Seals and a grant from the Oregon Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts.
