Women needed to plan spring meeting

An enthusiastic call is out for women to bring "energies, ideas and commitments" to an open meeting to plan the University Women's Symposium next spring. The meeting will be held Tuesday, Nov. 1, from noon to 1 p.m. in the EMU, room to be posted.

Karen Aydt, symposium representative from the ASUO, says all persons interested in working on the symposium are encouraged to bring ideas for workshops or to volunteer for committees at the meeting.

Aydt, together with Donna Shepard of the Women's Referral and Resource Center and Barbara Koser from the Ethnic Studies department, helps form a loose-knit administrative liaison between volunteers and committee heads. "We're the glue or putty that keeps people together," Aydt says.

The trio will discuss fund-raising ideas and themes for the symposium at the afternoon meeting. Aydt says "Passages in a Woman's Life" has been suggested as a major symposium issue and the group plans to schedule guest speakers, panel discussions and entertainment to explore this topic.

Last year's symposium focused on issues ranging from careers to health to day care, and Aydt hopes this year's program will provide a similar array of ideas.

Plans are already in the making for a women's art show during the week-long event and a workshop on minority women.

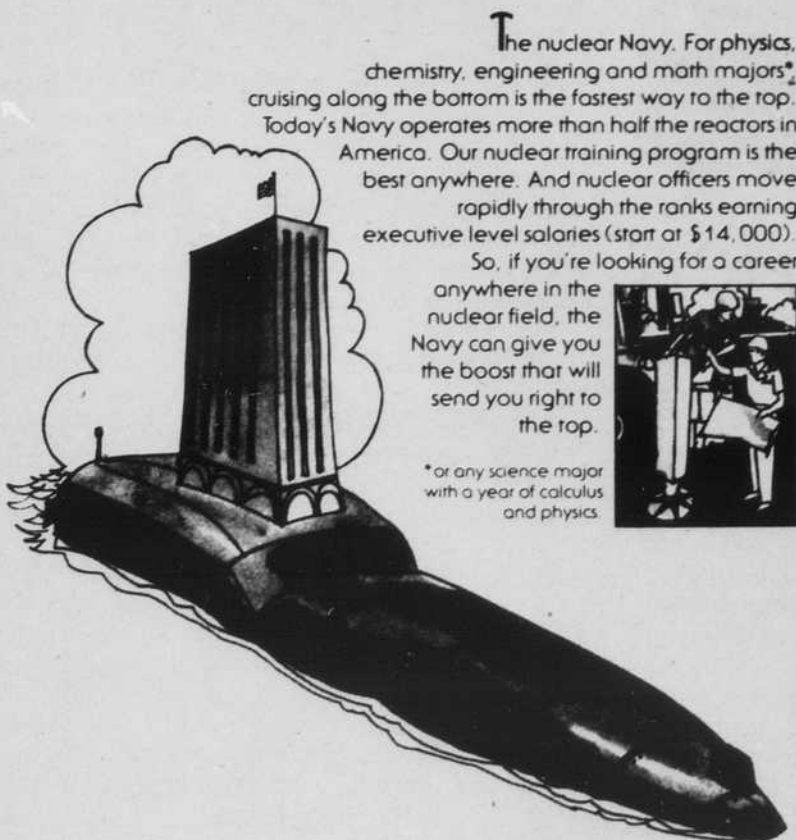
