Archaeologist to speak

In a lecture at 107 Lawrence Hall Wednesday, a noted American archaeologist will describe relics removed from a classical Greek town which once stood within the boundaries of modern Israel.

Saul S. Weinberg, director of the Museum of Art and Archaeology at the University of Missouri at Columbia and 1977-78 Norton Lecturer of the Archaeological Institute of America, will discuss the archaeological and historical significance of Tel Anafa, one of a few Hellenistic sites excavated in Israel.

The lecture is sponsored by the Archaeological Institute of America and the University Classics and Art History departments.

Hundreds of coins found indicate that the town, once a commercial center, was founded in the Third or early Second Century B.C. and was destroyed in about 75 B.C.

World reporter to speak

Veteran international news correspondent Wilfred Burchett will deliver a guest talk Wednesday in 167 EMU at 8 p.m.

Burchett, the first Western correspondent to file reports from Hiroshima after the atomic holocaust in 1945, will speak on "Revolution — A View from the Front Lines."

His free public talk is sponsored by the University Cultural Forum, the Mayday Cultural Committee and the Eugene chapter of the National Lawyers Guild.

Burchett was international correspondent for more than 40 years. He was a foreign correspondent for the Guardian, the independent Marxist newsweekly. He has recently reported from China, Vietnam, North Korea, Laos, Mozambique, Angola and the Middle East.

He has also written biographies of Ho Chi Minh and Norodom Sihanouk and several books and articles on contemporary political issues.

Bike licenses available

The University "Bicycle Patrol" will again offer free bike registration for students Wednesday through Friday in the EMU.

"We want to make it convenient for students to register bikes," says Kelly McKirdy, coordinator of bicycle patrol.

After this week, campus security will issue warnings and citations to bikes not licensed or in violation of parking regulations, according to McKirdy. "We don't want to have to impound bicycles," he says, "but if they aren't registered, we will have to enforce it."

So far, McKirdy estimates 50 per cent of the bikes on campus, or 1,600 bikes, have been licensed by the Bicycle Patrol. "This is fairly good, but not as good as we'd like," he says.

Last year, 124 bikes were reportedly stolen and some 20 per cent were returned to their owners. But if a bike isn't registered, McKirdy says, there is no way of tracking it down.

So far this term, the Bicycle Patrol has been able to return one bike that was registered by the University.

Registration will be held Wednesday from 12:30 to 5 p.m. and Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. After formal registration, licenses may be obtained at the Campus Security Office.
