

Orr holds seminar tonight

A seminar with Leonard Orr in Spiritual Physiology will be held tonight from 7 to 11:30 at the Unitarian Church, 40th Avenue and Donald Street.

Orr is the founder of Rebirthing and Theta International and is a leader of the Human Potential movement.

Rebirthing is a process of healing the breathing mechanism

by reliving and clearing early trauma.

In the seminar, Orr will present a metaphysical approach to the mastery of the physical body. He will deal specifically with rebirthing and immortality, Kundalini and the relationship of the inner and outer breath, the meaning of the physical body and the meaning of food.
