Grant given noise study

The University has received a \$27,300 grant from the National Science Foundation for the study of the distortion of wanted sounds by unwanted noise.

The studies are being conducted by Harold Hawkins, a professor of psychology on leave from the University of South Florida. Hawkins is a specialist in cognition and human information processing.

Hawkins said until now most research in this area has focused on how noise prevents hearing.

His project will concentrate on lower levels of noise and will show exactly how various amounts and sources of noise distort wanted sounds.

He expects the study to be complete in 1979.

Ocean corps recruiting

Representatives from the U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) will be on campus today to interview science and engineering majors interested in becoming commissioned officers in the NOAA Corps.

The NOAA Corps, one of the nation's seven uniformed services, consists of more than 350 men and women officers who assist in studying the total physical environment of the earth; the use of ocean resources, monitoring and predicting conditions in the atmosphere and the consequences of environmental modification.

The officer-scientists of the NOAA Corps command a fleet of 27 ships that ranges from a 65-foot fishery ship to a 303-foot oceanographic ship.

To be eligible for the program, students must have taken advanced math and at least one year of physics, including mechanics, electricity and light.

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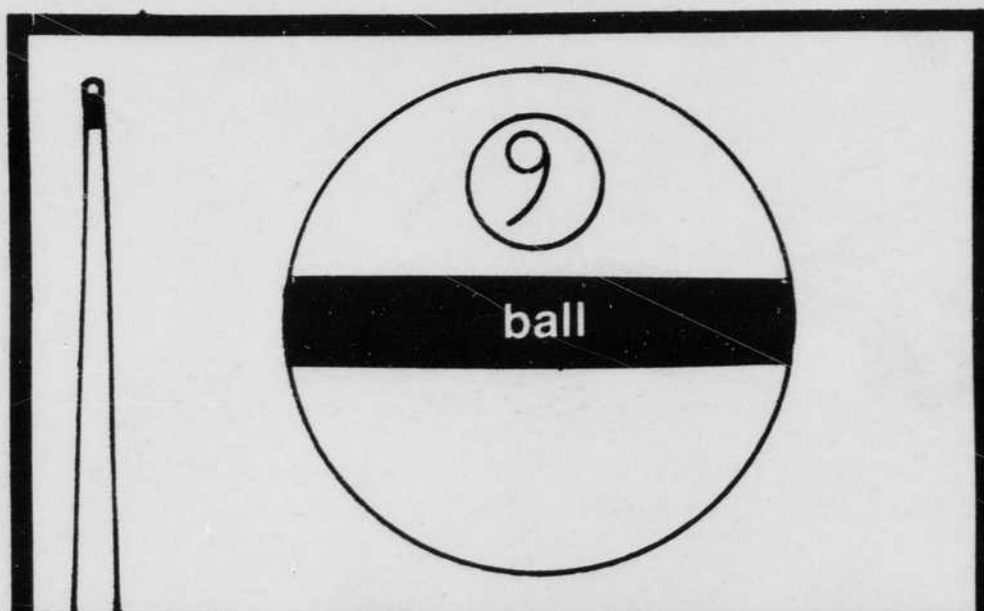
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
