African rep speaks today

Thami Mhlambiso, U.N. representative from the African National Congress (ANC) of South Africa, will speak today on the current situation in South Africa in the Forum Room of the EMU.

The ANC was formed in 1912 with the support of Mahatma Gandhi. The movement has pursued its strategy for non-violent resistance to the South African white regime for over fifty years.

However, after the Sharpeville massacre of March, 1960, the ANC turned its strategy to armed resistance. The ANC is currently in alliance with South African organizations concerned with causing a transition to majority rule in southern Africa.

Mhlambiso will also testify at the State Board of Higher Education meeting, Friday in the EMU Ballroom. His testimony will be in favor of state board divestiture of its stock in corporations doing business in South African countries.

Mhlambiso will also hold a press conference Friday morning from 9:30 to 11 a.m. in the EMU Forum Room.

These and other questions commonly heard from students can be answered today at a "question-and-answer" table in the EMU first floor lobby.

The information is co-sponsored by Career Planning and Placement, student services, financial aid, Office of the Registrar, International Student Services, Learning Resource Center, Academic Advising, Orientation Office and the Counselor for Athletes.

Two surveys conducted by the University last year showed many students are unaware of the services for which they are eligible.

Bob Bowlin, custodian of student records, said the information table is the first step in trying to increase student awareness of workings of the University.

The table will be open from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. and will be staffed by at least two representatives from one of the participating offices.

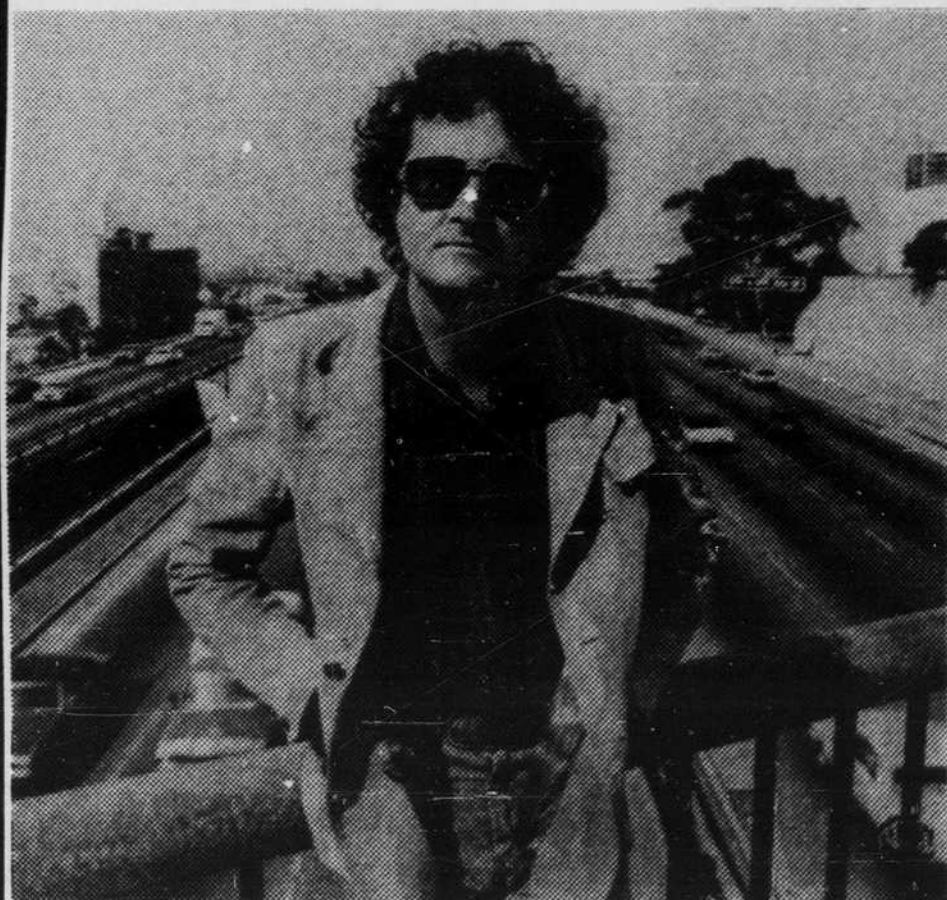
