

Offices observe holidays

Several offices on campus and in Eugene will be closed for the Thanksgiving holidays.

The University library will close today at 5 p.m. and will be closed all day Thursday. The library will reopen from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday and will resume its regular hours on Saturday.

The Museum of Art will be closed for a 5-day weekend, from Thursday through Monday. It will reopen Nov. 29 on its regular schedule, noon to 5 p.m.

Students who want to swim over the holidays will find the Leighton pool open on Friday. Gerlinger pool will be closed from the entire weekend, but the building will be open Friday. Leighton pool will be closed Thursday, Saturday and Sunday.

The Office of the Registrar will be closed Thursday and Friday for the Thanksgiving vacation.

Outpatient clinic services at the University Health Center will be closed Thursday through Sunday, but emergency services will be available at the Beech Street entrance.

The Eugene Post Office will be closed Thursday, also in observance of Thanksgiving Day.

Service windows will be closed and there will be no carrier delivery other than express mail and special delivery. Mail will be picked up from collection boxes on the holiday schedule as posted on each box.

Federal, state and county offices will be closed Thursday, and will reopen for business as usual Friday.

Russian poet to speak

Soviet poet Andrei Voznesensky will make his only appearance in Oregon Monday at 8 p.m. in Cone Fieldhouse at Willamette University, Salem.

Voznesensky, on his fourth tour of American colleges and universities, will read his works in Russian. English translations will be read by Oregon poet William Stafford.

The Soviet poet has been an outspoken critic of the USSR's restrictions on intellectual freedom and an advocate of human rights. His relations with his own government have alternated between favor and disfavor.

The reading at Willamette University is free and open to the public.

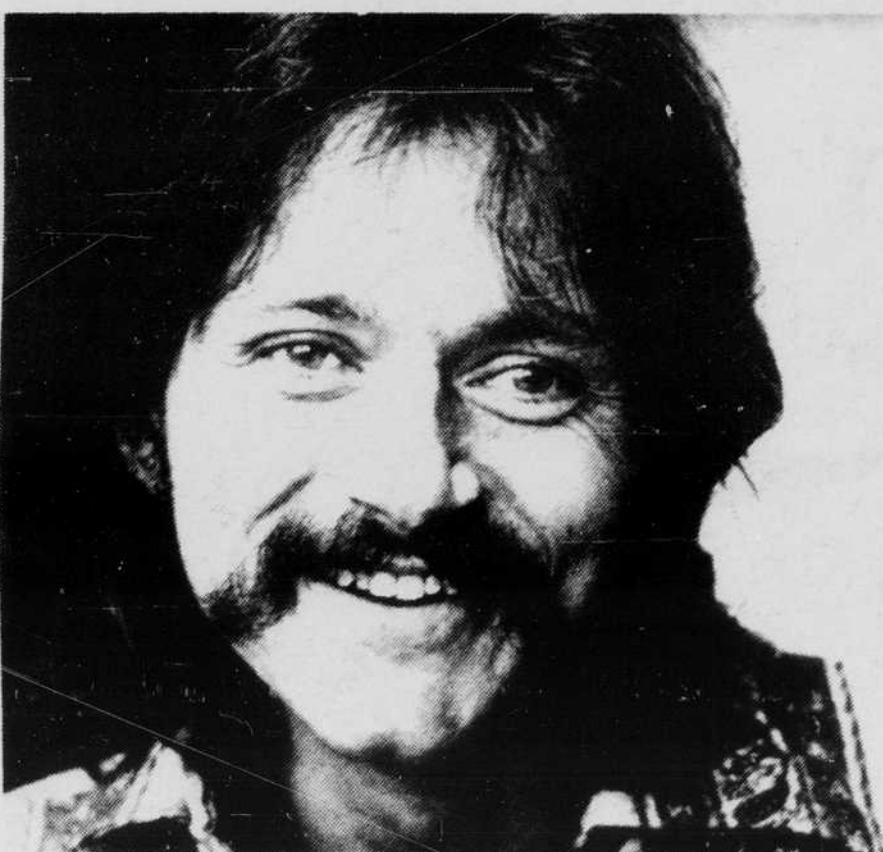
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Prof receives military money

University physicist Russell Donnelly has been awarded a one-year grant of \$59,074 from the U.S. Air Force Office of Scientific Research for continued funding in a long-term study of "Turbulence and Statistical Mechanics."

In the basic scientific research project, Donnelly and other University investigators are studying the behavior of fluids at extremely low temperatures.

Dean of CSPA gives address

EUGENE — James Kelly, dean of the CSPA department, was one of seven psychologists to give commemorative addresses in celebration of the 50th anniversary of the Department of Psychology at the University of Texas.

Kelly, also a psychology professor, spoke at the Austin campus Nov. 16 on "Research Process" and participated in graduate seminars and meetings of the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health.

Get oriented this weekend

The University Orienteering Club will conduct a Class A regional orienteering meet Thanksgiving weekend, Saturday and Sunday, in the Mt. Pisgah area southeast of Eugene.

Orienteering is land navigation by means of map and compass. In competitive form, it is a timed cross-country race using the skills of hiking, running and land navigation on a pre-set course.

The Mt. Pisgah meet is one of fewer than 12 sanctioned annually by the U.S. Orienteering Federation. "Class A" means winners qualify for national standing.

There will be 14 categories of competition, from novice through "elite." Each day there will be five cross-country courses from which competitors may choose.

Participants must be at least 14 years old to enter competitively, but the club welcomes non-competitive entrants of any age who wish to do a course for personal satisfaction.

Club advisor Phil Richey said the best runners do not necessarily win the competitive events because skill with a map and compass is as important as speed.

Trophies will be awarded to the first, second and third place teams in all categories. Individual winners will receive medals.

Persons wishing to enter the meet may register Friday at the University ROTC building, 1679 Agate St., between 5 p.m. and midnight.
