

Talk on nuke waste set

A University of California at Berkeley scientist who is a specialist in the biological hazards of radiation and a critic of nuclear power generating plants, will speak at the University Wednesday on the difficulties of disposing with radioactive waste materials.

Dr. John Gofman, professor emeritus of the Division of Medical Physics at UC-Berkeley, will deliver a free public lecture at 8 p.m. in Room 138 of Gilbert Hall. His topic is "On the Way to the Bank — Why there Will Never Be a Sol-

ution to the Problem of Radioactive Waste."

Gofman is visiting the University to talk with students in an undergraduate biology class on the "Scientific Aspects of Nuclear Energy." Scientists who are proponents and opponents of nuclear power generation have been invited to speak to the class.

The evening lecture by Gofman is being co-sponsored by members of the biology class and the University Department of Biology.

U receives research grant

The University has received a grant of \$7,722 from the National Institute of Education to study the ways Oregon school districts are meeting the requirements of recent federal legislation to provide public education for the handicapped.

During the one-year study, researchers will review a sampling of school districts around the state.

According to James Crosson, University professor of education, the results of the project may document ways school districts can be more effective in providing services to handicapped students.

Student earns fellowship

A Eugene graduate student has been named the recipient of the University's 1977-78 F.G.G. Schmidt Fellowship in German.

Ingrid Ryan, graduate teaching fellow in the Department of German and Russian, has been selected for the \$250 fellowship.

The 1977-78 recipient holds her diploma from the University of Vienna and her M.A. degree from Indiana University. Before beginning graduate work at the U, she taught in Munich, Germany, and Beirut, Lebanon.

Nutrition and alcohol subject of weekly talk

Nutrition and alcohol will be the topic of this week's Community Alcohol Education program, tonight at 7:30 at the Central Presbyterian Church, 15th Avenue and Patterson Street.

Carol Hendrix of Lane County Council on Alcoholism and Eleanor Latterall, dietician of Serenity Lane will be guest speakers.

The council teaches that alcoholics often suffer from malnutrition, and other consumers of alcohol may also suffer deficiencies of vitamins, proteins and other important food elements.

Send Christmas mail soon

"Now that Thanksgiving is past, it's Christmas 'Mail Early' time," according to Postmaster Ethan Newman.

"Mail Early" dates for domestic mail other than Alaska and Hawaii haven't been established this year. Parcels by Priority (air) to Alaska and Hawaii should be sent by Dec. 16, parcels by surface (ship) should be sent by Thursday, letters and cards should be sent by Dec. 14.

In addition to mailing early, there are several things mailers should do to insure their package is delivered in time and in good condition.

All items should be cushioned enough to keep the package from being crushed by the pressure of other packages placed on it.

Mailing containers should be corrugated or fiberboard boxes with a pound test strength of at least 175. This is usually printed on the bottom of the box.

Sealing is important, and reinforced tape should be used instead of scotch or masking tape. Paper overwrapping and packages tied with string should be avoided.

The address should be correct and legible so it can be read from two feet. Domestic parcels are now sorted by zip code, and for foreign parcels, the country name must be the last item of the address and printed in capital letters.
