

Housing advisers needed

Lane County Commissioners are looking for county residents interested in serving on the new Housing and Community Development Commission, a citizens' advisory committee.

Persons who have an interest, concern or knowledge of housing and community development are encouraged to apply by Dec. 7.

The 13-member group will be involved in furthering the county's housing goals and programs, recommending changes or additions to existing housing and community development policies and performing citizen participation tasks, as part of the federal housing and community development block grant program.

The make-up of the group will include two people meeting poverty guidelines, a senior citizen, representatives from each of the five commissioner districts, three tenants of low cost housing, a representative of an existing advisory group with the department of Community Health and Social Services and a representative of the county's recognized community organizations.

Application forms are available from the county's Community Relations Office, 125 E. 8th Ave., Eugene. Forms may be mailed upon request.

Jazz Lab Band to play

Under the musical direction of Prof. Charles Dowd, the group will perform compositions by Stan Kenton, Thad Jones/Mel Lewis, Super-sax and Herbie Hancock.

The band will also perform arrangements of progressive big band jazz by Robert Curnow, Clare Fischer, Phil Woods, Thad Jones, Herbie Hancock, Glen Garrett and Antonio Carlos Jobim.

Admission will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for students and senior citizens.

Proceeds from the concert will help defray travel expenses when the group competes at the Pacific Coast Collegiate Jazz Festival in Berkeley, Calif. In 1976 and 1977 competitions, the Jazz Lab Band I received superior ratings from top adjudicators in the film and recording industry.
