

Rites honor former prof

A memorial service will be held today at 11:30 a.m. at St. Mary's Episcopal Church chapel for a former University music professor, George Milton Dieterich, who died Thursday at age 75.

Dieterich, of 395 W. 29th Ave. in Eugene, was a faculty member from 1945 to 1959. An accomplished cellist and organist, he served as choir master for St. Mary's Episcopal Church from 1946 to 1962. Dieterich composed more than 350 church anthems.

An Iowa native, Dieterich was born Sept. 23, 1902, and graduated from Grinnell College. From 1924 to 1934, he was a music professor at Oklahoma University. From 1934 to 1943, he was on the faculty of Bemidji State Teachers College in Minnesota.

Dieterich served as a USO director during World War II. After his wartime service he moved to Eugene and joined the University's School of Music faculty.

He is survived by three sons, Thomas of Whittier, Calif., Richard of San Leandro, Calif. and Donald of Anaheim, Calif., and three daughters, Nancy Richardson of San Mateo, Calif., Patricia Dakin of Upland, Calif. and Frances Dieterich of Austin, Tex.

EMU crafts faire begins

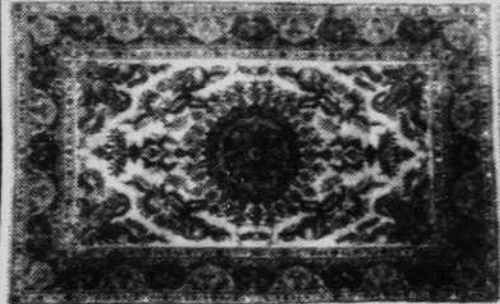
