

Council eyes alcoholism

The Lane County Council on Alcoholism asks what causes one out of 10 people who use alcoholic beverages to have problems because of drinking.

Some of the underlying psychological mechanisms involved will be described by Lowell Grabau, psychologist of the Mental Health Division, at the next Alcohol Education program this evening at 7:30 at Central Presbyterian Church.

Grabau will describe such psychological phenomena as tension-relaxation, conditioning and the role of the subconscious.

'Ernie Game' screened

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Symphony to feature John Jarvie

Classical guitarist John Jarvie, a University music instructor, will be the featured performer at a Eugene Symphony Orchestra concert at 8 p.m. today and Wednesday at the Beall Concert Hall.

Jarvie, who has gathered outstanding reviews for his classical music performances in Oregon and Washington, has been acclaimed a versatile classical stylist. He attracted renewed public praise when he appeared with jazz flutist Paul Horn in concerts in Eugene and Portland.

A music instructor for 10 years, Jarvie has been performing for 15 years. He teaches at Lane Community College as well as the University. He has studied with guitarists Ralph Towner of New York City and Michael Lerimer of Berkeley, Calif.

Jarvie will play Jaquin Rodrigo's "Concierto de Aranjuez for Guitar and Orchestra." The Rodrigo piece attempts to capture the mood of an old Spanish town that was used as a summer residence for Spanish kings.

Lawrence Maves, conductor of the 100-member community orchestra, has also scheduled performances of Mozart's "Symphony No. 39 in E-flat Major" and Elgar's "Variations on an Original Theme ("Enigma").

Concert tickets are available at the symphony office at 1245 Charnelton St. Ticket prices are \$3, \$3.50, \$4.50 and \$5 a piece. Tickets will be available at the door each night of the concert.

Ponty will perform

French jazz and rock musician Jean-Luc Ponty will appear in concert at 8 tonight in the EMU Ballroom.

Tickets for "An Evening with Jean-Luc Ponty" are \$5 for students and \$6.50 for the general public. They are on sale at the EMU main desk and at the Sun Shop.

Trained in classical music from the age of five by his musician parents, Ponty entered the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique in Paris at age 15. Following graduation, he spent three years, with the Concerts Lamoureux Symphony Orchestra.

In 1964, he left the symphony to play jazz exclusively and pioneered the use of the electric violin in jazz and rock.

Ponty worked on Elton John's album, "Honky Chateau," and played with the Mothers of Invention in 1973. He joined the Mahavishnu Orchestra in 1974, touring with that group until the spring of 1975, when he organized his own touring band.

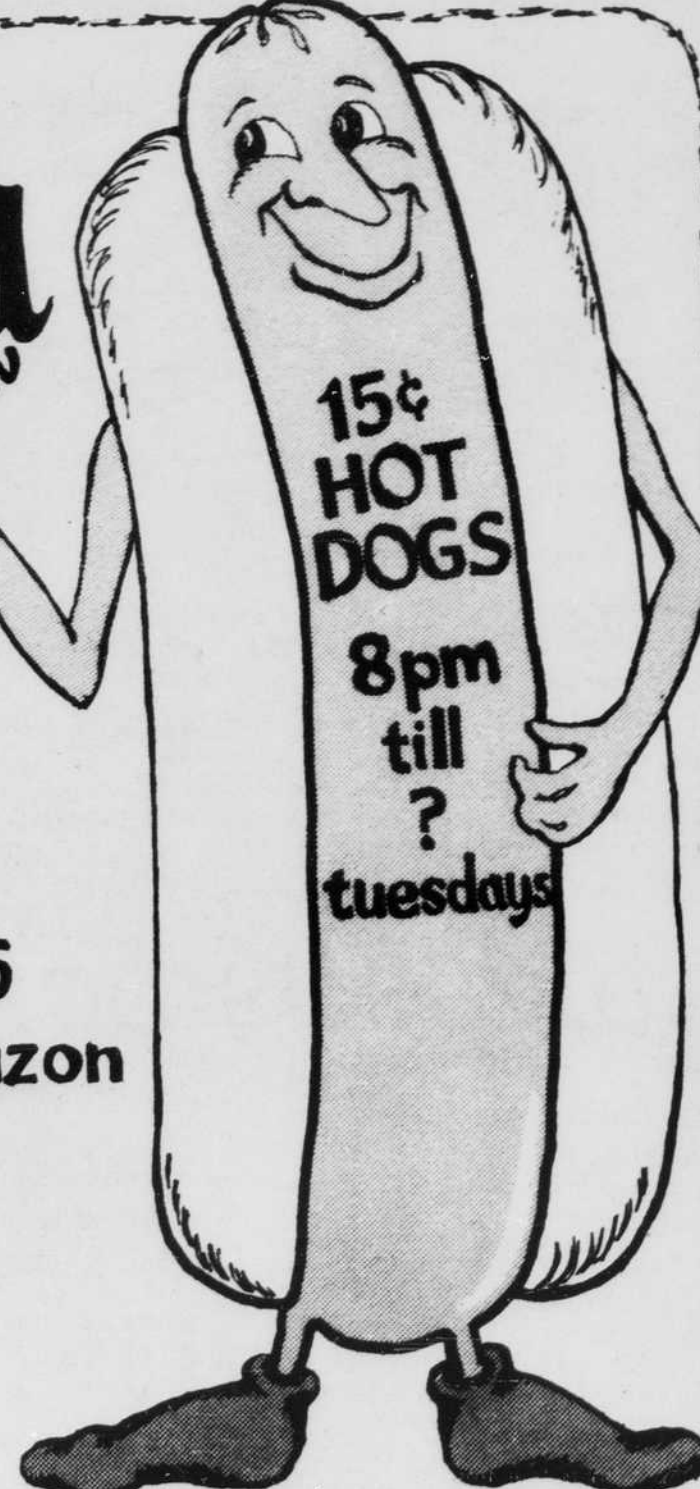
