

Waive goodbye to health

Students who have a good background in health may take a health proficiency exam to exempt them from taking one of the health courses needed to meet graduation requirements.

The test will be given each day at 1 p.m. during winter term registration.

The exam is based on course content included in basic health courses in Oregon universities. It covers 10 general areas of health and health care, communicable and degenerative diseases, family health, nutrition, mental health and illness, drugs, consumer health care, community health, environmental health and sanitation, accident prevention and first aid. A passing grade is needed to waive the course.
