## Radiation seminar today

A colloquium with Ronald Kathren of the Portland General Electric Company today will feature "Ionizing Radiation Protection Standards" at 3:30 p.m. in Room 16 Science I.

The evolution of ionizing radiation protection standards will be traced from the time of Roentgen and the discovery of radioactivity to the present.

The scientific bases, both physical and biological, will be presented along with a discussion of the biological implications of radiation exposure from medical x-rays, consumer products and nuclear power.

## Grants offered for winter term

The State Scholarship Commission has announced that funds are available to award Need Grants to eligible resident undergraduates for winter and spring terms.

For the first time, the grants are being made available to juniors and seniors who have never been on the program before.

Need grants may be awarded to students for a maximum of \$166 a term at the University. A student who wishes to be considered for a grant for winter term must file a

financial aid form with the College Scholarship Service within the next two weeks.

Financial Aid Forms received by the Scholarship Commission after Jan. 1, 1978, will be evaluated for spring awards to eligible students.

## LCC offers new course in electronics
