

## Sign up for community ed.

Area residents who missed the mail-in deadline to participate in the University's Community Education program winter term still have an opportunity to sign up for classes.

The University will hold a special registration today from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in McArthur Court.

The program allows area residents to enroll in virtually any University class at a reduced tuition rate and without having to fulfill all the normal admission requirements.

To be eligible for registration as a Community Education student, residents must never have been enrolled as a regularly admitted student or must not have attended the University as a regularly admitted student since completing a University degree. Registrants may sign up for up to six credit hours per term.

More than 80 Eugene area residents already have signed up for winter term classes through the program's new mail-in registration.

### Kerns Center offers classes for adults

Winter term art classes for adults, teens and children are offered at Maude I. Kerns Art Center beginning Jan. 9 through March 17. Registration for the ten-week term runs until Jan. 6, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the art center office, 1910 E. 15th Ave.

Class tuitions vary from \$20 for children's classes to \$37.50 through \$65 for adult classes.

New classes offered are Soft Sculpture for Children and Adults, Introduction to Fiber Arts, Hand-building Pottery and Independent Printmaker's Workshop. Regular course offerings in black and white photography, fibers arts and weaving, calligraphy, stained glass, jewelry, pottery, painting, drawing, and printmaking are also scheduled this term.

### Men topic of workshop

The YMCA Singles Association (YSA) is sponsoring a special series on the role of men in our society Thursday at 2055 Patterson St.

A lecture titled "The Changing Role of Men in Today's World" will be offered at 50 cents for YSA members and \$1.50 for non-members.

A discussion series for men only called "Man, the Parent, the Conqueror, the Person," will begin Sunday and last for six weeks. Sessions will cover the socializing process, relationship patterns and skills, sexuality, the male as a parent and the future.

The purpose of the discussion series is to provide male participants with a safe supportive environment in which to examine their role in contemporary society and the social, cultural and interpersonal pressures which are forcing them to redefine and redevelop that role.

Preregistration for the series is required by Thursday. Cost is \$15 for YSA members and \$30 for non-YSA members for the six-week series. Further information can be obtained by calling Fran Simmons, YSA Coordinator, 344-6251.

Both the lecture and discussion series will be presented by Don Nahnsen, ACSW, a counselor in private practice who teaches at Lane Community College and is co-author of "Parents and Children, A Guide to Parental Survival." He has a master's degree in social work with an emphasis on relationships and family counseling.
