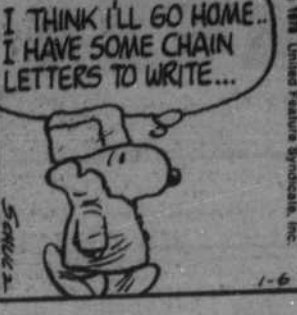
This free event is the monthly meeting of Friends of New Games in Lane County.
