

Israeli Sinai villages debated

(AP) — Prime Minister Menahem Begin said Sunday Israel may withdraw its offer to return all of the occupied Sinai Peninsula to Egypt if Egyptian Pres. Anwar Sadat refuses to allow existing Jewish settlements to remain there.

Begin spoke to a gathering of right-wing supporters in Tel Aviv two hours after the Israeli cabinet voted in Jerusalem to "strengthen" existing settlements in the Sinai but decided not to build new ones.

If Sadat continues to demand a total civilian pullout under a peace agreement, Begin said, Israel may demand a change in its borders on the Sinai, which it captured from Egypt in the 1967 Mideast War. He did not elaborate but clearly meant Israel would try to make the settlements part of its own territory.

Referring to Sadat's demand, reported last week, that Israel abandon its Sinai outposts, Begin said: "The Israelis do not burn settlements. They build settlements and keep them." In other de-

velopments Sunday:

•A hand grenade exploded in a crowded bus station in Arab East Jerusalem, slightly injuring three persons, Israeli police said. The station, a commuting point for many Arab workers, is a frequent target of attacks by guerrillas trying to dissuade Arabs from working in Israel.

•Sadat, returning to Egypt from talks with Sudanese Pres. Jaafar el-Numairi, told reporters he is undecided and "must see details"

of an Israeli plan for an Israeli-Jordanian-Palestinian committee to administer the occupied West Bank of the Jordan River and the Gaza Strip until residents decide their own status in a referendum.

Sadat demands independence for the Palestinian Arabs in the West Bank and Gaza, with a possible link to Jordan, but Israel has proposed only limited self-rule with a continued Israeli military presence.

•In Beirut, Lebanon, Palestinian leader Yasir Arafat accused the United States of "instructing the treasonous hand" that assassinated the Palestine Liberation Organization's London spokesman, said Hammami, last week. He spoke at Hammami's funeral services.

Other Palestinian officials have blamed Palestinian radicals for the killing. Israeli Cabinet Secretary Ariele Naor said the plan to strengthen Sinai settlements was in line with a peace plan Begin presented to Sadat at their Christmas day summit in Ismailia, Egypt.

Energy imports might damage value of dollar

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pres. Carter told Energy Secretary James Schlesinger on Sunday that Saudi Arabia, France and Iran are "particularly concerned" that excessive U.S. energy imports are damaging the value of the dollar.

The president met with his energy chief on the eve of Schlesinger's departure for a week of energy meetings with government officials in Saudi Arabia and Morocco. The secretary plans to return to Washington on Jan. 16.

"The Saudis and the Shah and the French were particularly concerned with the value of the dollar and also that excessive energy imports are the main problem," Carter told Schlesinger. The value of the dollar has been sinking recently on foreign exchanges.

"They're certain to make public their concern where it doesn't intrude into our political structure," Carter said in reviewing with Schlesinger his talks with foreign leaders during his recent trip to Europe, Asia, and the Middle East.

Rhodesian army hunts for rebels

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP) — Troops on Sunday searched the countryside 20 miles from Salisbury for black guerrillas who reportedly killed six persons and forced the weekend evacuation of a recreational park.

The slayings were the closest open attacks to the capital in the five-year war between nationalist guerrillas and forces of the white-minority government, police said.

However, guerrillas are believed responsible for planting two bombs that killed 11 persons and wounded 70 in Salisbury last August.

The military command said in a communique that the latest slayings occurred Saturday when guerrillas killed Sheila Cumming, 44, and her daughter Sarah, 15. The two whites were visiting a farm near the town of Norton, 20 miles southwest of Salisbury.

Those killings followed the robberies of two Norton taverns in which the military command reported three security force men and a black civilian man were killed by guerrillas. It was believed that the same guerrilla band was responsible for all six deaths.

The communique said the Cummings were killed about 4 p.m.

South African lecturer killed

DURBAN, South Africa — A white university lecturer who had been banned from teaching because of his opposition to South Africa's racial segregation was shot and killed Sunday at his home in a Durban suburb, police reported.

They said the murder occurred shortly after a masked gunman in a nearby black township critically wounded a former black nationalist guerrilla who had testified for the state at the trials of other guerrillas.

Police in this coastal city were investigating the possibility that the two shooting were linked, the South African Press Association reported. It said no arrests have been made.

Foreign credit limits proposed

WASHINGTON — Rules to prevent banks from extending too much credit to individual foreign borrowers were proposed Sunday by Comptroller of the Currency John G. Heimann. National banks are prohibited from lending more than 10 per cent of their total capital to any single borrower, but the problem becomes complicated when applied to foreign countries. For instance, if a U.S. bank has loaned 10 per cent of its resources to a foreign government, can it loan another 10 per cent to a utility which is half-owned by the government?

Argentine warships set sail

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina — Argentine warships sailed south Sunday toward the tip of South America where a dispute with Chile over three tiny islands threatens to expand into a conflict over Chilean rights in the Atlantic Ocean.

Both Argentina and Chile are ruled by right-wing military governments.
