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Kentucky's undefeated Wildcats living up to early expectations

"The 1978 Kentucky Wildcats will have all the ingredients of a championship team..."

So began this season's prospectus of Kentucky's basketball team in the Southeastern Conference brochure.

The Wildcats are living up to expectations in the SEC, at.

With a record of 11-0, including a 3-0 mark in the SEC, they not only are tied for the conference lead with Alabama, but for the third consecutive week, they are a unanimous choice as the nation's top-ranked team.

In balloting released Tuesday, the Wildcats received all 46 first-

place votes and a total of 920 points from a national panel of sportswriters and sports broadcasters in The Associated Press poll.

In the past week, the Wildcats, defending SEC co-champions with Tennessee, easily beat league rivals Vanderbilt, Florida and Auburn in remaining one of the nation's few undefeated teams and retaining their No. 1 ranking.

One slip by the Wildcats most likely would have cost them the top spot because the seven teams ranked behind them compiled a 13-0 record.

Runner-up North Carolina increased its mark to 12-1 by winning twice and received 737 points in the balloting. Third-ranked and unbeaten Arkansas, 13-0, posted three victories during the week and amassed 693 points.

Defending NCAA champion Marquette, 10-1, also won three times and maintained fourth place with 594 points. Notre Dame, 7-2, idle during the week, held fifth with 522 points.

The came No. 6 Indiana State, 10-0 and 480 points, and seventh-rated UCLA, 11-1 and 463 points. Each won twice last week. Eighth-ranked Syracuse, 11-1 and 342 points, won its only game.

Meanwhile Louisville, 9-2, which ended Cincinnati's 69-game home court winning streak, climbed from 10th place to ninth, and Kansas, 11-2 last week, vaulted from 14th to 10th after winning its only game.

Nevada-Las Vegas, 14-1, headed the Second Ten and was followed by Michigan State, Holy Cross, Providence, Virginia, North Carolina State, Georgetown, D.C., Indiana, Cincinnati and DePaul.

Michigan State made the biggest jump, going from 18th to 12th, while Cincinnati took the biggest fall, plunging from 12th to 19th after losing two of three games.

Newcomers among the elite were North Carolina State, 10-1, and DePaul, 11-1.

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Lloyd Neal contributed six points to a third quarter scoring surge Tuesday night and the Portland Trail Blazers went on for a 126-113 National Basketball Association victory over the New York Knicks.

The Blazers ripped off 14 points in a row in the third quarter spurt to take a commanding 80-56 lead and had little trouble holding the

advantage. A Knicks comeback effort led by rookies Toby Knight and Ray Williams fell short.

Portland's reserve center, Tom Owens, led all scorers with 22 points. The Blazers got 21 points from guard Lionel Hollins and 20 from regular center Bill Walton.

The victory was Portland's seventh in a row and its 40th in succession in Portland over two years.
