After years, this classic is once again available in the original wide-screen version. Joseph Losey's "The Servant" stars Dirk Bogard as a man-servant who gradually takes over a palatial house and dominates his master.

Orson Welles directed and stars in this 1945 tale of an unwary sailor who gets sucked into the self-destructive machinations of a rich cripple (Everett Sloane) and his wife (Rita Hayworth, then Welles' real life wife). Pushed off their ancestral tenant farm by the Dust Bowl and mechanized agriculture in the early 30s, the Joad family leaves Oklahoma to work in California. They discover they are unwanted because of other thousands like them, willing to work for starvation wages. Novel by John Steinbeck. Directed by John Ford. Starring Henry Fonda, John Carradine and Jane Darwell.
