## JSU sponsors speech

The Jewish Student Union/Hillel will sponsor Dr. Lee Neidengard, pediatrics and genetics specialist of the University Health Sciences Center, for a speech tonight at 8 EMU, room to be posted.

Neidengard will discuss the Tay-Sachs disease, a recessive genetic neurological disorder that is fatal in an afflicted child.

Families of Jewish heritage and of Eastern European ancestry have the greatest chances of having a Tay-Sachs child.

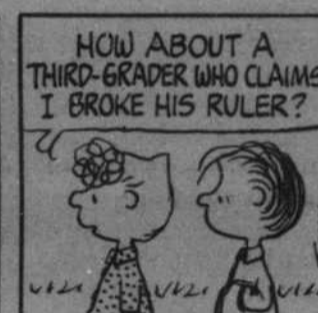
