

Begin attacks Egypt's 'chutzpah'

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Menahem Begin lashed out at Egypt Thursday for "chutzpah" — brazenness — in its demands and unreasonableness in its peace talks. But he said Israel stands ready to resume the negotiations.

Speaking to a group of French Jews, Begin also said it was "inconceivable" that the United States would pressure him to make concessions to Egypt.

Secretary of State Cyrus Vance, trying to revive the negotiations, later conferred with Begin and is to fly to Cairo on Friday to meet with President Anwar Sadat.

Begin told a joint news conference after

their talks that Vance would "try to convince President Sadat that the negotiations . . . should be renewed. We wish him Godspeed and good success."

Vance said he would report to Begin after his meeting with Sadat "and then we shall determine how to proceed from there."

In Cairo, Sadat heard a report from Foreign Minister Mohammed Kamel, the chief negotiator he summoned home abruptly Wednesday from Jerusalem after only two days of what were supposed to have been comprehensive talks on political aspects of a peace settlement.

Sadat, considering his next move in the fast-developing situation, rescheduled an emergency session of the Egyptian Parliament from Saturday morning to Saturday evening.

"If the Egyptian government should at any day decide to renew or resume the talks, the government of Israel will be prepared to do so as well," Begin said in his speech to the French audience in the Israeli Parliament building. "We hope the talks will be resumed. It is up to Egypt."

Though Begin said the next step is Egypt's, the Egyptians have said Israel

must change its position if the Jerusalem conference is to resume.

Begin gave no indication whether he would accept Sadat's proposal that the separate military negotiations in Cairo be reopened Saturday. Those talks focus on an Israeli withdrawal from the Sinai Peninsula.

The Egyptians have said Begin's tough public pronouncements while the talks were under way were one reason for Sadat's abrupt suspension of the negotiations. The Israeli's speech Thursday offered no hint of apology for his previous remarks, however.

Last Beetle rolls off line

EMDEN, West Germany — The last Volkswagen Beetle sedan, Nazi dictator Adolf Hitler's legacy that helped West Germans beef up their post-war economy, rolled off a German assembly line Thursday.

Since Daimler Benz made the first 30 prototype Beetles designed by Ferdinand Porsche 40 years ago, Volkswagen built 19.2 million Beetles to surpass the previous production record of 15,007,034 set by Henry Ford's Model T in the late 1920s.

The Beetle continues to be produced in Mexico, Brazil, South Africa and Nigeria. Models sold in Germany from now on will bear a "made in Mexico" tag.

Hijacked plane returned

QUITO, Ecuador — An Ecuadorian commercial aircraft hijacked to Cuba after leaving Quito returned here Thursday.

Aboard the Saeta Airlines were its pilot, Patricio Mosquera, five crew members and 21 passengers. All were reported in good condition. The plane, with 60 passengers and six crew members, was hijacked 20 minutes after leaving Quito Wednesday.

Squatters dismantle homes

CAPE TOWN, South Africa — Black squatters racing to stay ahead of government bulldozers hurriedly dismantled their flimsy homes at the Unibell shantytown Thursday. The camp that housed 20,000 blacks just a week ago was expected to be flattened by the weekend.

Before the demolition of the illegal camp began Monday, defiant squatters had vowed to stay in their shacks even when the bulldozers arrived. But on Thursday they were working with makeshift crowbars to pry apart the corrugated iron, cardboard and wooden structures.

Economy grows at slower rate

WASHINGTON — The nation's economy grew at its slowest rate of the year in the fourth quarter, the government reported Thursday, but Commerce Department officials termed the full year's pace strong and likely to continue so.

Gross National Product expansion of 4.2 percent in the final quarter brought the year's average down to 4.9 percent, or only slightly below the administration's target of 5.1 percent.

FBI's Oswald file dates to '59

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI file on Lee Oswald prior to the assassination of Pres. John F. Kennedy on Nov. 22, 1963, goes back to 1959 and contains 69 items.

A list of the file's contents furnished to the Warren Commission on May 4, 1964, was among the FBI documents made public Wednesday. The list begins with a newspaper clipping from the "Corpus Christi Times" dated Oct. 23, 1959, about Oswald's defection to the Soviet Union.

Then in chronological order, the inventory of the FBI's file has

another news account about Oswald going to Moscow, a notation that FBI files at the time had no information on him but there was a military service fingerprint card apparently related to Oswald and a State Department telegram saying Oswald had appeared at the U.S. embassy in Moscow to renounce his American citizenship.

The file also refers to an interview with Marguerite Oswald, his mother, regarding his plans to attend the Albert Schweitzer College in Switzerland. The FBI's attache in Paris advised that Oswald was not enrolled in the Swiss

college. Naval Intelligence advised on Nov. 15, 1960, that Oswald had been given an undesirable discharge from the Marine Corps Reserve Aug. 17, 1960.

Then in 1961 there were checks about Oswald's passport and inquiries in Dallas about him, including an interview with his mother regarding his plans to return to this country.

It goes on: an FBI check of Marine Corps files on Oswald, background information sent to the naval attache in Moscow on Oswald and an FBI memorandum of Nov. 4, 1959.
