"The Bronze Age in Greece: 2000 Years of Puzzles" an illustrated lecture by Professor Terpsichori Tzavella-Evjen. Free. 8 p.m. 107 Lawrence. Tzavella-Evjen will examine and propose possible solutions for the numerous problems which the archaeologist encounters when trying to reconstruct the history of Greece in the Bronze Age (c. 3000-1000 B.C.). She will attempt to answer many of the difficult questions concerning the period. She will also attempt to propose how items such as the ash-pits and bone tubes were used by the Bronze Age Greek in his daily life. Tzavella-Evjen is a Bronze Age specialist whose Ph.D. was received from the Univ. of Athens in Greece in 1970. She has been on the faculty of the Univ. of Colorado since 1966, where she is now an associate professor in the classics department. She excavated with Prof. S. Marinatos at five sites including Pylos and Santorini (Thera). Also, she has directed her own excavations for six seasons at the Early Helladic habitation site near Thebes called Lithares.
