

Bronze Age lecture set

A free public lecture called "The Bronze Age in Greece: Two Thousand Years of Puzzles," will be presented tonight at 8 in 177 Lawrence Hall.

Terpsichori Tzabella-Evjen, a classics professor at the University of Colorado, will examine and propose possible solutions for numerous problems facing the archaeologist seeking to reconstruct the history of Greece in the Bronze Age (3,000 to 1,000 B.C.). She will address herself to such questions as where the Early Bronze Age people came from, and when Greek speaking people arrived in Greece.

Costa Ricans visit campus

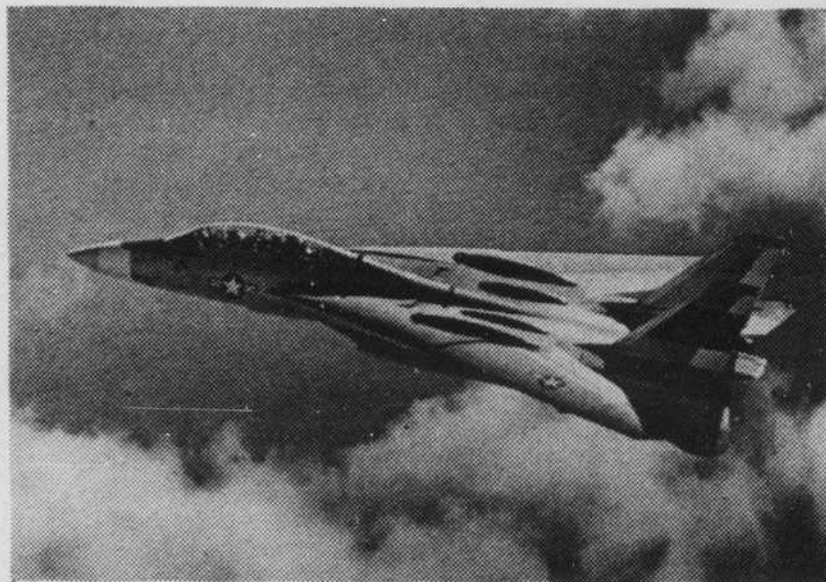
Six Costa Rican educators will spend three days, beginning today at the University under the Partners of the Americas Teachers Exchange Program.
