

Money awaits takers

There's \$3,280 up for grabs, and nobody's grabbing it. The Office of Student Services is looking for five or six students with work study grants to fulfill job openings, but has gotten only one response to date.

Shirley Wilson, associate dean of students and coordinator of services for the handicapped, says the jobs consist of readers, library research assistants and typers for five blind University students. She stresses that work schedules are very flexible.

The University is obligated to help handicapped students through Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, which states there must be complete access of education for the handicapped.

"Our blind students are the ones we haven't been able to help," says Wilson. "They're the ones that are in a crisis state."

Interested students with work-study grants should contact the Work Study Office in Oregon Hall to set up an interview.

Management seminar set

Legals focus on immigration

The program is designed to present substantive information and basic skills necessary to handle immigration cases, especially designed for legal practitioners.

This conference is designed to explore developing areas of law and to provide a forum for discussion.

Members of the committee allege that photo overlays they released in 1970 "are positive proof E. Howard Hunt and Frank Sturgis of the CIA killed John F. Kennedy," former U.S. President.

Committee member Paul Kangas, who says he was Kennedy's special ceremonial body guard in the U.S. Navy in 1962, says "It shook a lot of us really deeply when he was killed."

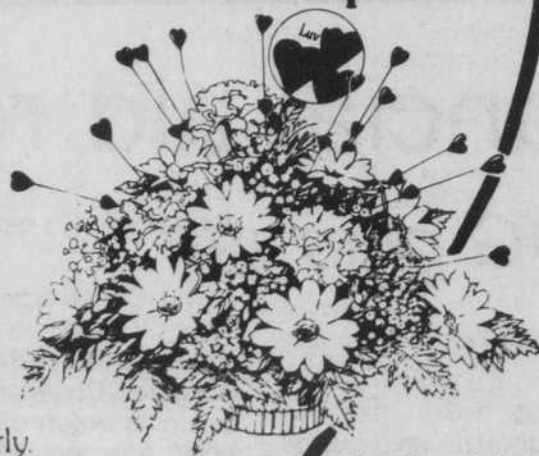
