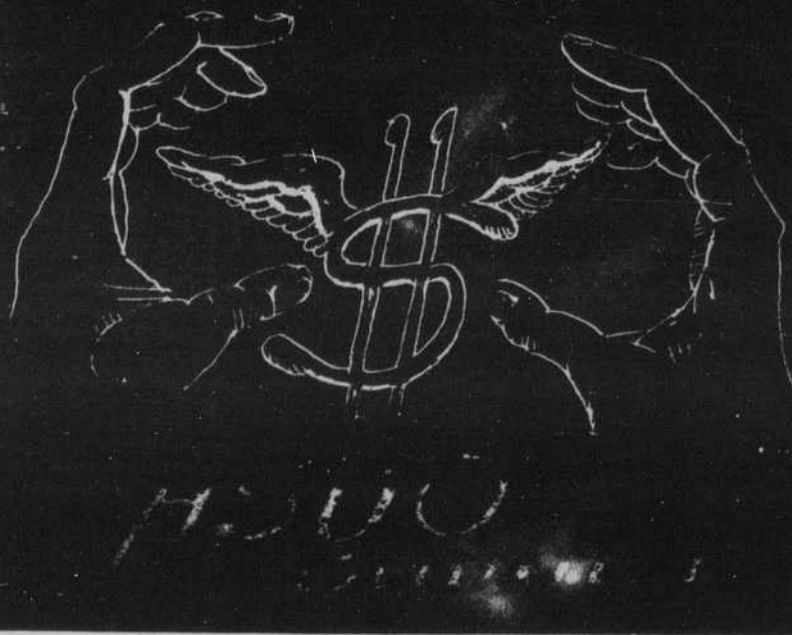


IFC approves

The Incidental Fee Committee (IFC) rejected all goals proposed by ALERT, an ASUO-sponsored program supporting handicapped students, and challenged the program's future when it met Monday night.

Five more hearings set for tonight

IFC budget hearings continue throughout February, unless otherwise posted in EMU, Room 101, next to the Post Office. Times and days held will vary. Today's hearing is the last this week, with hearings resuming again on Sunday.

IFC members encourage student attendance and participation.

ALERT goal presentation produced debate between IFC members and ALERT director Chester Fallor.

They argued over whether ALERT should continue to exist or whether its goals of advocacy and legislative lobbying could be carried out more effectively through the Office of Student Advocacy and ASUO Executive.

The committee then unanimously rejected ALERT's second goal to run a National Wheelchair Athletic Association qualifying meet in 1979.

ALERT's goals and budget will be resubmitted and reconsidered in April.

GPA, denies ALERT

(GPA) and the Gerontology Association fared better.

The GPA presented four goals and all were approved above Mary Gilmore's recurring dissent.

Gilmore rejected all GPA-proposed goals saying she had no personal objection to the group but that the people who elected her did not find the GPA a valid program.

Two GPA goals, approved 6-1, were to provide support and resources to gay-oriented students and to operate the GPA office efficiently.

Another accepted GPA objective, to provide information and education to non-gay students, was accepted 4-2 with Dave Tyler joining Gilmore in dissent. Ted Walker abstained.

The final GPA goal was to provide programs (such as Gay Pride Week) that integrate the other goals and encourage public dialogue on sexual orientation issues. The goal was approved 4-3. Doug Benson, Tyler and Gilmore cast dissenting votes.

The Gerontology Association presented 11 goals to the committee. All were accepted.

Tuesday evening the committee met for four hours and discus-

sed five programs, including SEARCH, University Theatre, the Asian American Student Union, Forensics and University Veterans.

All three SEARCH goals were unanimously approved. The objectives were to maintain a facilitator role for alternative learning through classes and workshops, develop and instigate "one-time" special projects and maintain efficient office procedures.

The University Theater had only one goal, which was approved 7-0; to attract students to the theater group and to continue generating growing student attendance.

Asian American Student Union members outlined a detailed group of goals, most having sub-goals and objectives. The first six were passed unanimously. They included: a state-wide recruiting program, sponsorship of a Northwest Asian American student conference, initiating a systematic approach to their participation in the Early Orientation and Registration Program, continuing comprehensive orientation services, maintaining a quality new staff re-

cruitment program and continuing a resource center for Asian American affairs.

Two goals were approved 6-1, with Janet Eggleston dissenting, to organize social and recreational activities for students and to operate the union year-round. Two other goals were approved unanimously, to function as an Asian American student advocate and to continue sponsorship of educational and cultural programs to increase awareness of the Asian American experience.

The next program considered, Forensics, offered four goals for discussion, all of which passed 6-0, with Tyler absent. The goals approved were to continue a strong level of forensics, aid in administering University sponsored debate tournaments, promote the agency and maintain efficient office practices.

The University Veterans Association, a new group, was the last heard. Both its goals were also passed 6-0, with Tyler absent. The goals were to disseminate information to University veterans and to act as an advocate in identifying problem areas for veterans.

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
