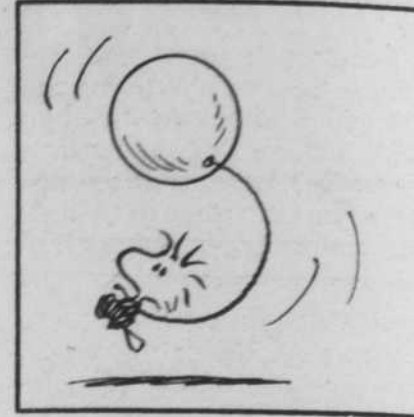
## Renter's tax refund information available from housing office

## Gay testimony to be aired

Highlights of public testimony on the sexual orientation amendment to Eugene's Human Rights Ordinance, followed by a live discussion, will be broadcast at 8 tonight on radio station KLCC-FM (90.3).

The testimony was given at a public hearing before the city council last October. Opponents

of the amendment have secured enough petition signatures to refer the matter to the voters at the election May 23.

KLCC-FM has invited speakers to discuss the issue from VOICE, the organization sponsoring the referendum, and from Eugene Citizens for Human Rights, a group that opposes repeal of the amendment.
