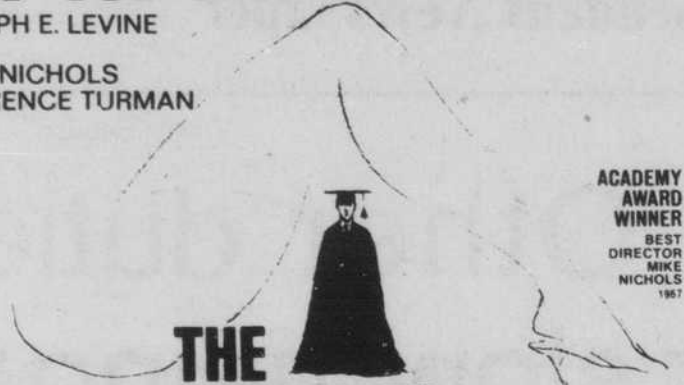

### Pay discussion set Saturday

Oregon State System of Higher Education student employees will meet Saturday to discuss the minimum wage issue and design new strategies for persuading institutions to pay the \$2.65 rate.

Students and leaders from Oregon's seven major colleges and universities will attend the meeting at noon in the EMU, room to be posted. Ray Alley, from the Oregon Institute of Technology, where student workers recently went on strike to demand minimum wages, will speak.

### Forestry forum held Sat.

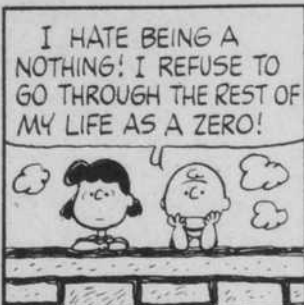
Jerry Rust, Lane County commissioner, will speak to the Forests and Oregon's Economic Future Conference Saturday at the EMU, room to be posted.

Seven workshops involving representatives of conservation groups, the timber industry, labor and experts in wildlife, forestry and economics are scheduled to bring together information and data to be used in developing a Conservationist's Agenda for forest policy in Oregon.

The conference, sponsored by the Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group (OSPIRG), will begin at 9 a.m. Rust's speech is at 9:15 a.m.

Topics for morning workshops, scheduled between 10 a.m. and noon, are "Public Forest Land Use Planning," "Public Timber Management Plans," "Private Forest Land" and "Other Forest Resources." The afternoon workshops will cover "The Timber Economy," "Non-Timber Forest Economy" and "Non-forest Economy."
