Women sharp in weekend wins over Beavers, Oregon College

Having shaken off the sloppiness that plagued their game last weekend, the Oregon women's basketball team put together two well-played games to beat Oregon State in Corvallis 59-58 Friday and totally destroyed Oregon College of Education 90-40 in Mac Court Saturday.

"We dominated from beginning to end," said Oregon coach Elwin Heiny of the OCE contest. "They didn't present the game we thought they would. We played two good halves."

Oregon hit early and never looked back. Shannon Kelly scored from the left corner to give the Ducks a lead they never relin-

quished. OCE closed to within 1 with 30 seconds gone in the game, but before the Wolves could score their first field goal, with just over seven minutes gone in the half, the Ducks had already amassed a 14-4 lead.

Part of OCE's problem was missing many close, uncontested shots. The other part of the problem was good defense by Oregon. OCE shot only 30 percent from the field for the game.

Against Washington two weeks ago, the Ducks had trouble with the 2-1-2 zone defense thrown against them. This week, Oregon picked apart OCE's 2-1-2 zone.

"We've been working against a zone in practice," said Heiny. "At the beginning we were getting high percentage shots."

Oregon handily controlled the boards, out-rebounding OCE 43-36. OCE, looking like it picked up the sloppy play Oregon left behind, committed 39 turnovers. Although Oregon's ball-hawkers picked up 16 steals, OCE still

threw the ball away 23 times.

Oregon had five players in double figures — the same five also had seven rebounds apiece. Shannon Kelly led all scorers with 25 points. Renne Lambrecht was high for OCE with 11 points, only four of which were from the floor.

Debbie Adams had a fine inside game against OCE, scoring 16 points and grabbing 7 rebounds.

"Debbie's been getting rough recently," Heiny said. "When she goes up, she goes up strong. She's getting eight, nine, ten rebounds per game."

The Ducks' passing game, which has been lacking in recent games, was again evident in the OCE game. Oregon had only 10 assists for the game, only because many field goals were a result of offensive rebounds.

Duck swimmers set records in regional but still fall short of winning Huskies

Oregon established seven NCWSA swimming records over the weekend but it wasn't enough to overcome a strong team effort by Washington as the Duck women took second in the regional meet in Seattle.

Oregon finished second overall despite the performances of Kathy Hemmer and Michelle Menkens, who together set five

new regional records over the three day meet.

Hemmer claimed three new marks, winning the 400 individual medley, 200 butterfly, and 1650 freestyle. Menkens set standards in the 50 and the 100 freestyles.

Oregon teams also set records in the 400 medley and 400 freestyle. Leslie Aiken, Tama Cuddeback, Robin Wheeler and Kelly

Peyton combined for a win in the 400 intermediate while Wheeler, Peyton, Hemmer and Menkens teamed for the freestyle relay crown.

Oregon entered the final day of the meet trailing 860.5 to 745 after the Huskies' Arlene McElvaine edged Hemmer in the 100 backstroke, 1:01.82 to 1:02.41. Washington also won the 200 freestyle relay Friday night.

McElvaine made it a clean double by beating Peyton on Saturday in the 50-meter backstroke.

Menkens went head-to-head with rival Sarah MacDonald of Simon Fraser, and beat her opponent two of three times. Menkens won both the 50 and 100 freestyles in beating MacDonald, although MacDonald evened the score in the 200 free with a win and a new NCWSA mark of 1:53.80.

In all, Oregon qualified five swimmers (Wheeler, Menkens, Peyton, Hemmer and Cuddeback) for the AIAW championships to be held in Durham, N.C.

Starzenski, Dan Hollembaek, Don Brown and Dan Thorsness. Randy Besaw got a draw in his 177 pound match.

Oregon assured itself of a winning dual meet season by beating Central Washington, 35-11, Saturday night. The Ducks benefited from three forfeits in the match that finished their dual season at 12-11.

Ron Finley's squad now prepares for the Pac-8 championships Friday and Saturday in Corvallis.

Bliss sets Duck win mark

Scott Bliss set a school record for wins in a season Friday night, highlighting a three meet sweep by the Duck wrestlers over Washington foes.

Bliss' record came in the second match of the swing, when he defeated Washington State's Drellevich, 21-7. The old school record of 31 wins was set last year by Kevin Kramer.

Coach suffers arm injury but Flying Ducks still win

Oregon's Tom Truedson tied a school mark for the pommel horse and Jim Kelch won the all-around as the Flying Ducks defeated Washington over the weekend in a two-day meet in Seattle.

Truedson turned in a 9.7 compulsory score, tying Curt Rod-

gers' mark set in the Pac-8 meet last year. Kelch added a compulsory total of 54.55 to his total optional score of 52.45 to capture the all-around title. Teammate Gene Christensen was second with a 106.25 total.

Although his team had a relatively safe meet, Oregon coach Bill Ballester didn't fare so well, tearing a tendon in his right bicep as he spotted for Jim Hamilton on the rings. This is the second such injury for Ballester in 13 years, and he is expected to undergo surgery sometime this week.

Meanwhile, another injured Duck did better. Scott McEldowney, who earlier needed cortisone shots in his right shoulder to ease pain, hit 9.7 marks both days. Oregon swept the rings Saturday with McEldowney, Jerry Bush, and Kelch finishing in that order.

Oregon next hosts powerful Brigham Young and Portland State this Friday and Saturday in Mac Court.

Women finish second in meet

Oregon's women gymnasts scored one of their highest scores of the year, but still fell to Washington, 123.90 to 118.85, in a quadrangular meet in Seattle last Friday. Montana had 112.50 and Boise State had 107.05 in the meet.

Wendy Halberg took second in all-around with 31.20 and won the floor exercise and balance beam events. Patty Thompson took second in the vault and Sue Wilson tied for second in the uneven bars.
