

## Architect Bonta to speak

Argentinian Architect Juan Paul Bonta will give three talks at the University today and Tuesday.

At 8 tonight he will speak on "An Anatomy of Architectural Interpretation." His talk Tuesday at 11:30 p.m. will be on "Design of Chess Sets." At 8 p.m. Tuesday he will speak on "Expressive Systems in Architecture."

All the talks, which are non-technical, will be in Room 1107 (Lawrence Hall). They are free and open to the public.

Bonta, formerly a professor of architecture at the University of Buenos Aires, is on the faculty of Ball State (Ind.) University. He is an internationally known scholar in semantics, the study of signs and meaning systems. He is the author of a forthcoming book, "Expressive Systems in Architecture."

Bonta's visit to the University is sponsored by the Departments of Landscape Architecture, Architecture and Art History and the School of Architecture and Allied Arts lectures committee.
