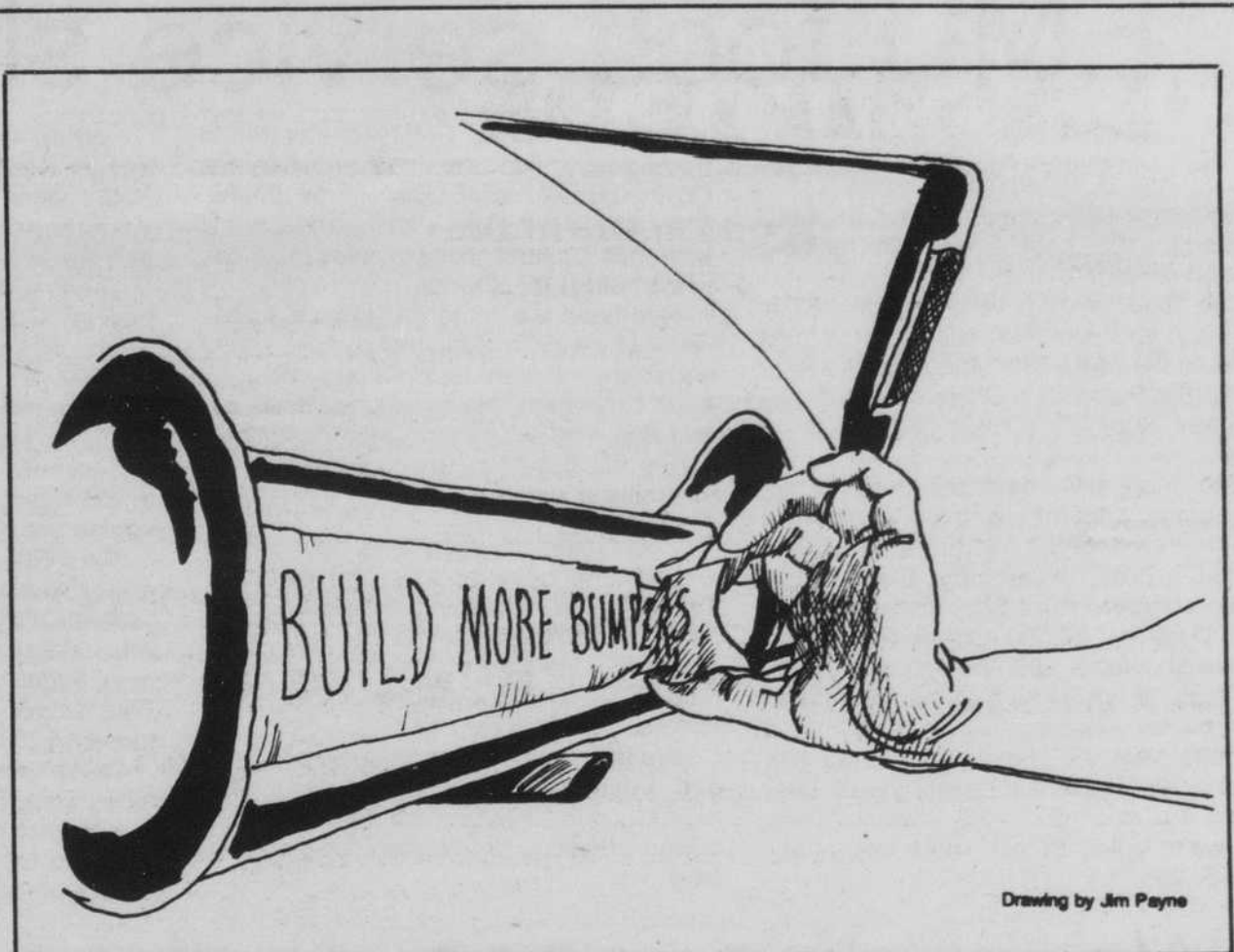

Senior loses job, tries printing own meal ticket

When Grace Chipman reached old age, lost her
job and had no money, she didn't give up. She
went into the bumper sticker business.

"Every car should be decorated with bumper
stickers," says Chipman, a Cottage Grove resi-
dent. "They're a good way to let the world know
what you're thinking."

Chipman has advocated bumper stickers since
last October when, because of health problems,
she had to quit her job as a "senior companion."
According to Chipman the job was one of those
"make-work" jobs the government dreamed up
for elderly and low-income people.

She spent a period of time in the hospital and
when she was well enough to go back to work, she
found she had been replaced and no other open-
ings were available.

Chipman was not discouraged, however. She
says she got a lot of ideas for work from all the
"salesmen's magazines" that she subscribes
to and eventually came up with the idea of making

and selling bumper stickers.

She sent away for the machine to print the
stickers and when it arrived last fall she began her
own bumpersticker printing outfit — Grace Enter-
prises.

Unfortunately in six months she hasn't sold one
bumper sticker. But she's undaunted.

"I'm still trying to drum up business," she says.

Chipman's press is not an elaborate piece of
machinery, but consists of a block of wood in
which she arranges the letters into the words to be
printed, inks the letters and then rolls the bumper
sticker paper through for printing.

Right now, Chipman only prints lettering on the
stickers but eventually hopes to include pictures
on the stickers by using linoleum tile cuts.

The stickers are available in any color and cost
range from \$2 to \$3 apiece.

Chipman says she she will print anything on the
stickers — as long as it will fit. Any interested

The Gen. Don Zimmerman Squadron will attend
the National Conclave in Phoenix, Ariz. in April where
they will compete for national recognition for the
squadron and the University.
