"Stan Getz in Israel — A Musical Odyssey," will be shown at 7:30 and 10:30 p.m. Filmed while on a three-week tour of Israel, Getz takes time out to meet and talk to some of his local counterparts. In this film, Getz uncovers what could possibly be the ethnic roots of his own music. The film has been described as a "thoroughly captivating musical documentary."

The second film, to be shown at 8:30 p.m., is "I Was Born In Jerusalem." Yehoram Gaon, one of Israel's most popular singers, leads a personal tour of the golden city of Jerusalem. The attraction, magic, mystery and wonder of this historic city is revealed in the film through the views and scenes of the city's life.

Tax tapes now at library

Federal income tax instructions on cassette tapes prepared by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) are now available at the Eugene Public Library.

The tapes, which can be checked out like books and used at home, contain step-by-step guidelines for the preparation of IRS forms 1040 and 1040A, including the two most common accompanying schedules used with the 1040. The schedules A and B are used for reporting itemized deductions and income from interest and dividends, respectively.

The library is located at 100 W. 13th Ave. and is open from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday and Saturday and from 1 to 5 p.m. on Sunday.
