

Model UN session set

About 200 college students are expected to participate in the Northern Regional Institute of the Model United Nations of the Far West. The meetings are scheduled at the University Friday and Saturday.

The conference will feature meetings of four of the seven major committees of the General Assembly, the Economic and Social Council and the Security Council. Other bodies will meet at the Far West Conference in Seattle April 12 to 15.

The conference opens at 1 p.m. Friday in the EMU, room to be posted. The afternoon session will be followed by a banquet at the Eugene Hotel, where conferees are staying. An evening session at the EMU will follow.

Committee and council meetings conclude Saturday between 9 a.m. and noon. The General Assembly will consider resolutions beginning at 1:30 p.m. Saturday. The conference is expected to end about 4:30 p.m.

The public is invited to observe proceedings. A conference spokesman said the General Assembly session Saturday afternoon will be the most interesting session for observers.

Parent educator to speak

Oscar Christiansen of the University of Arizona will be featured at the Oregon Society of Individual Spring Conference, Friday and Saturday at the Valley River Inn, Eugene. The conference topic is "Understanding the Child."

Christiansen will demonstrate an approach to gaining complete understanding of the child, emphasizing a cooperative rather than an adversary relationship between the home and school.

Christiansen is a well-known parent educator. He earned his doctorate at the University of Oregon under Adlerian/Dreikursian scholar R.N. Lowe and for one year was coordinator of the Community Parent-Teacher Education Center in Eugene.

The program will begin with a banquet and an introductory speech by Christiansen at 7 p.m. Friday at Valley River Inn. On Saturday participants will observe a four-part program beginning with an 8 a.m. registration.

Pre-registration is encouraged, but participants may also register at the time of the conference. The registration fee for both days is \$20 for students. For further information, call Mollie Romine, 686-1619.

There will be several recitals by University music students at Beall Concert Hall this week.

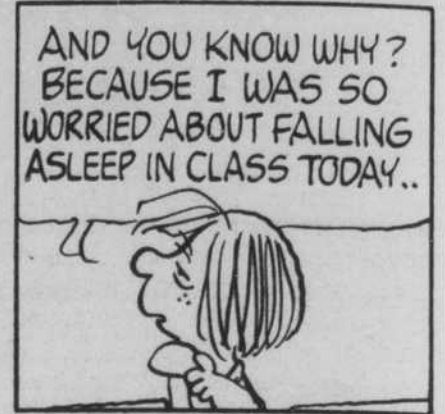
The composition department will present a recital of student works at 12:30 p.m. today.
