

Minority council making 'right' moves

The Council for Minority Education is "moving slowly but in the right direction" toward assisting University minority students and recruiting new ones, according to

Gary Kim, the council's interim coordinator.

The 16-member council, which was formed by faculty legislation in May, 1976, serves as "a foundation to select proposals for services for minorities," says Kim.

"Both organizations and individuals can submit proposals," sukim says. "We screen the ideas and fund the best ones."

So far this year, the council has sponsored an orientation program for new Asian students and a civil

rights symposium on the Allan Bakke case before the U.S. Supreme Court. Special introductory mathematics courses have been offered to small groups of minority students, and grants to train minority students for business careers are planned.

The council also funds a minority outreach coordinator who is making the services of the University career planning and placement center "more available to minority students by taking the services out to the students," says Kim. Much of the coordinator's time is spent in the EMU.

Several proposals for recruiting more minority students are before the council. One would establish a state-wide network of "contacts" who would inform the University of potential students.

Another plan would encourage high school seniors from Chemawa Indian School in Salem to make two-day visits to the University during spring term.

Because the council relies on proposals from many different sources, "it's inefficient to a degree," says Kim, "but we think we'll get programs actively of interest to students."

Kim says the council, which consists of eight faculty members, four students and four community persons, has many "philosophical questions" to answer and "will go through a modifying process for about five years."

Some of the council's efforts are similar to an attempt last year by the ASUO to establish a minority recruiting program, says Kim. He says the ASUO's program "wasn't successful at all."

OLCC probe lacks evidence

SALEM (AP) — There is not enough hard evidence to criminally prosecute anyone as a result of an exhaustive probe into the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC), state and county officials said Tuesday.

Atty. Gen. Jim Redden, whose office conducted the investigation of alleged abuses by the OLCC told a news conference that it would be up to the Clackamas County district attorney to pursue any criminal prosecutions in the case. The OLCC offices in Milwaukie are in Clackamas County.

Redden said last week when the report on the three-month investigation was released that he would not recommend any criminal prosecutions.

Clackamas County District Attorney James O'Leary, responding to Redden's comment, said his office had reviewed the investigation and would not pursue it further.

"I've read the report very thoroughly, two of us in the office have, and we came to the same conclusion. It raises some questions but gives no answers that would be sufficient to base any prosecution on," O'Leary said in an interview.
