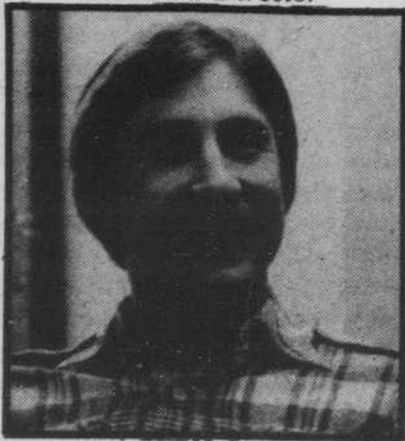

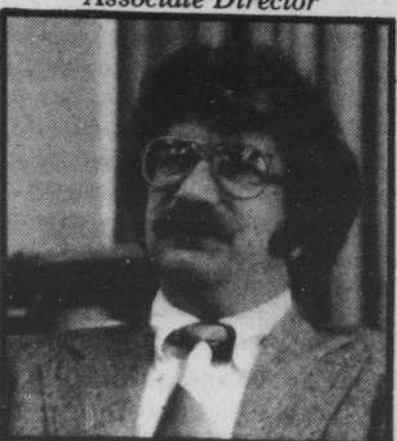

Receiving Aid

Q When and how will I hear about my eligibility?

A Offers of financial assistance are mailed

1. The first week of May, 1978, to all students who completed the application process by April 1, 1978

2. The first week of June, 1978, to all students who completed the application process by May 1, 1978

3. After June, 1978, the beginning of each month (if money is available) to those students who complete the application process during the preceding month

If you are not eligible, you will receive a letter suggesting other sources of funds. This letter will be mailed on the same schedule as stated above.

If money is no longer available, you will be notified by mail and informed of alternative sources of assistance.

Undergraduates who have completed the application process must also be admitted to the University of Oregon before they will receive notification of financial aid eligibility.

Q What do I do if I am offered financial aid?

A Read the offer of financial assistance and accompanying instructions and information carefully. Your acceptance must be returned to the Office of Student Financial Aid by the indicated date or the offer will be cancelled.

Q What should I do if I want a revision, re-evaluation, or clarification?

A An explanation of revision and appeal policies and procedures will be sent with the offer of financial assistance.

If you wish to discuss your offer of financial assistance with a counselor, make an appointment by calling the Office of Student Financial Aid, 686-3221.

Q How will I receive my financial aid?

A During registration each term credit vouchers

for grants, National Direct Student Loans, and scholarships and checks for Guaranteed and Federally Insured Student Loans and other outside aid are distributed in the Erb Memorial Union Ballroom. You must register before you can pick up your aid. These vouchers and checks are cashed with the University cashier to pay for tuition, fees, and University housing. Any change is returned to you to use for other educational expenses.

If you are employed on the College Work-Study Program, you will receive a monthly paycheck based on hours worked and the hourly pay rate.

Rights & Responsibilities

Q What are my rights and my responsibilities?

A Rights

1. You have the right to expect that your financial aid eligibility will be determined in an equitable manner, consistent with federal regulations and University policies.

2. If you are eligible for aid, you have the right to be considered for those programs for which you qualify, as long as money is available.

3. You have the right to complete information about how your financial aid eligibility was determined.

4. You have the right to full information about financial aid programs and pertinent regulations, policies, and procedures.

5. You have the right to expect that your and your parents' financial records and your award information will be kept confidential in accordance with the Federal Privacy Act of 1974.

6. You have the right to expect written notification of your financial aid award and any adjustments to it.

A Responsibilities

When you sign your award letter, you agree to fulfill your obligations as a financial aid recipient. When you sign a promissory note for a loan, you agree to pay it back. Thus it is your

responsibility to be aware of your obligations as well as your rights.

1. You are responsible for supplying complete and accurate information on which we base your eligibility for aid.

2. You must maintain satisfactory academic progress.

a. A full-time undergraduate student must complete satisfactorily a minimum of 12 hours per term.*

b. A full-time graduate student must complete satisfactorily a minimum of 9 hours per term.

c. A part-time student (at least 6 hours undergraduate, 5 hours graduate) must complete satisfactorily the number of hours upon which financial aid was based.

*You should be aware that if you enroll for and complete only the minimum number of hours per term, you will not be able to earn in four years the 186 credit hours required for a bachelor's degree. Your eligibility for some types of aid terminates if you have received it for 12 terms (4 academic years).

3. If you withdraw from school, you must see a financial aid counselor. (No appointment is necessary.)

4. It is your responsibility to report additional resources (such as employment or other financial assistance). If the receipt of

additional resources results in an overaward (financial aid and resources exceed the cost of education), the following steps will be taken:

a. Aid for subsequent terms in that academic year will be reduced.

b. If there is no aid to adjust or if you are not eligible to receive the aid already used, you will be notified to repay any Supplemental Grant or National Direct Student Loan.

c. An excess of College Work-Study earnings will be considered as a resource for the following academic year, and your subsequent award will be reduced.

5. You are responsible for reporting a change in your status because such a change may make a difference in your eligibility for financial aid. For example:

a. Death or unemployment of parent can change the parent contribution.

b. The budget used and the expected contribution from your spouse will be altered by a change from married to single status or vice versa.

c. If you become a resident, your educational costs are less, so a lower budget is used.

6. You are responsible for using the awarded monies for educationally related expenses as defined in the student budget.

Other Q's & A's

Q What if the Office of Student Financial Aid says I am not eligible for aid?

A If you are not eligible for aid awarded by the Office of Student Financial Aid, you will receive suggestions for alternative sources of funding.

You and/or your parents can make an appointment to speak with a financial aid counselor about the determination of your eligibility.

A change in financial status or a clarification of information previously supplied may warrant re-evaluation of your financial aid eligibility.

Q Can I get financial aid if I attend the University part time?

A Yes, it is possible to receive financial aid if you are at least a half-time

student. (6 hours per term undergraduate, 5 hours per term graduate).

If you are eligible for a BEOG, the award will be prorated as follows:

1. One half for 6-8 hours per term

2. Three-fourths for 9-11 hours per term

If you have completed the application process and want to receive aid for at least half-time enrollment, your financial eligibility will be determined by subtracting your resources from a standard budget.

There will be the following modifications to budget and resources:

1. The budget will reflect tuition and fees for the actual amount of hours.

2. Expenses for books and supplies will be prorated for half

time or three quarter time enrollment.

3. The minimum expected student contribution will be the budgeted amount for meals and housing and miscellaneous personal expenses.
