Commission recommends bond issue to special vote

Members of the Eugene Civic Center Commission decided Tuesday to recommend that an \$18.5 million bond issue to finance the construction of the performing arts complex portion of the proposed civic center be placed on the June 27 special election ballot.

The bond would only cover the cost of building a 2,500-seat concert hall and a 500-seat theater. The commission recommended that the city attempt to attract federal Economic Development Administration funds to complete the convention center and meeting rooms portion of the center.

At an earlier meeting, the commission had considered recommending that the entire project, estimated at about \$24 million, be financed by public bonding and that all components be built at the same time.

Tuesday's vote was 5-4. The minority side wanted the entire \$24 million package presented to the voters as a single bond measure. The majority favored a process where the center would be built in phases, with the perform-

ing arts complex being built first.

Proponents of the phase method said the rest of the center could be financed by expected increases in property tax revenues. They pointed out that proposed center allows for space for the construction of a hotel by private parties. They said the hotel would generate increased property tax revenues.

Before recommending the \$18.5 bond measure, the commission considered a proposal that the bond request be delayed until it could be determined if private fund-raising activities could generate enough money to help reduce the cost of the project.

Commission member Brian Obie joined with the minority in urging that the entire project be placed before the voters. He said that such an action would mean all components of the center would be built.

The proposed center would be built on a two-block downtown site bounded on the north and south by Sixth and Seventh avenues and on the east and west by Oak and Olive streets.
