Works in Clay by Shirley Herried. Gallery West, 1597 Oak. Herried's work includes storybook houses, complete with window boxes, nesting birds and thatched roofs with chimneys. However, she is best known for her figurine whistles. Some are actually caricatures from many fairy tales: Hansel and Gretel, Snow White and the Seven Dwarves, and the Bremen Town Musicians have all been turned into humorous musical sculptures. Others are well-known political personalities, a bear band and a complete Noah's Ark. Thru March.

Her sandcastings are usually of waterfowl, birds, and owls, and their surrounding habitat. About her watercolors, DeYoung says. "They are a result of a need for a spontaneous expression for the bird forms. Texture and feeling are a concern." Educated at the U of O and Portland Art Museum, DeYoung was the manager of the Rogue Gallery in Medford from 1968-74 and a participant in the "Artists in the Schools" program from 1974-77.
