Personnel must file new W-4s

Deans, department heads and payroll personnel must file new W-4 forms by April 30 to renew their income tax exemptions, according to Al West, payroll officer for the University.

The old W-4 form was revised to include a section for claiming exemptions from tax withholdings.

Interested persons may pick up the new forms at the payroll department at the business office. The W-4 exemption must be re-filed each year by April 30 to maintain continuous coverage.

Youth detention choices viewed

Alternatives to confining Eugene juveniles in detention centers, such as Skipworth Juvenile Home, will be considered by the Eugene Commission on the Rights of Youth.

At the commission meeting earlier this week, members decided to devote the next month to looking at other alternatives. Members were organized into subcommittees to examine other options.

The commission will consider the use or expansion of alternate facilities such as Looking Glass Family Crisis Intervention Center, the Christian Family Institute and youth group homes.

Commission Chair Don Chalmers said the entire commission will visit Skipworth. He said the visit would not be an "investigation," but rather an attempt to gather information about detention alternatives.

Church leader to speak

Hallam Shorrock, former director of Church World Service in Japan and Korea, will speak in Eugene Sunday at 7 p.m. and Monday at 8 p.m.

His topic Sunday is "The Politics of Charity: The Japan-Korea-America Triangle" at Central Presbyterian Church, 1475 Ferry St.

Monday he will speak on "American Foreign Policy and Political Repression in South Korea" in the EMU.

Shorrock spent more than 20 years in East Asia as a missionary. From 1947-1954 he was a missionary-teacher in Japan. He served from 1954-1961 as executive director of Church World Service in Japan and South Korea and from 1961-1963 he was Asia Secretary of the World Council of Churches in Geneva, Switzerland. He returned to Japan in 1963 to serve until 1969 as vice-president of International Christian University in Tokyo. He is currently Associate Director of Education Abroad for the University of California and a lecturer in Japanese.

Hallam Shorrock's visit to Eugene is sponsored by Clergy and Laity Concerned, a national peace and justice organization, and Korea Information Action Project, a university student group doing work around Korean issues.
