

Duck netters back to old 'ups and downs'

In terms of wins and losses, Oregon's men's tennis team experienced a troublesome weekend and coach Buzz Summers did not hesitate in pinpointing the problem.

He called it the old "ups and downs."

The end result was a weekend which saw the host Ducks open with a 6-3 loss to Nevada Reno, come back to clip Washington State 5-4, and then fall into the clamps of highly-favored Washington to lose 8-1.

"We are suffering from the ups and downs," said Summers. "We are just not getting it all together as a team. One player will play good in one match and then not as good in another. We are not consistent."

On Friday afternoon, Nevada-Reno swept four of the six singles events including wins over the Ducks top two netters, Jim Wilson and Russ Childers. Nevada-Reno captured the match with victories in two of the three doubles matches. Reno's number one singles man Brian McQuawn teamed with number two man

Trevor Allen to clinch the win by stopping Oregon's Tim Greider and Childers 6-1, 6-2.

When the Washington schools arrived Saturday, the Ducks continued their reign over Washington State, which has not defeated Oregon in Summers' eleven years as Duck coach.

But the win was a struggle. The match, tied at 4-4, came down to the top doubles match, which Greider and Childers won 3-6, 6-3, 6-4 over the Cougars' Roger Tyzzer and Jim Lee. Surprisingly, WSU went into the doubles holding a 4-2 lead.

But Oregon swept the doubles with Jim Wilson and Conrad Lopez also recording a win while Eric Lehto and Steve Bolstad romped to a 7-5, 6-3 win. Washington had gone into the double competition the day before against Reno only to lose.

"They played extremely well," praised Summers of the Cougars, "we have not lost to them in eleven years but we almost did today. It was really tight. Washington State has really improved since last year."

But Oregon received their poison against the Huskies. Washington quickly clinched the

win by sweeping the singles competition despite three-set struggles in the two and three singles. Childers pushed Husky sophomore Chris Romney to a final set before losing 6-3, 4-6, 6-4. Rick Grant came back to silence Greider 2-6, 6-1, 6-2.

Oregon's only win came from Greider and Childers again in the number one doubles with a 6-2, 7-6 triumph. The matches were played under cover when a series of rain showers soaked the 15th Street courts.

When taking a few minutes off in between matches, Summers managed to slip a plea in concerning the outside courts.

"Those (outside) courts are the worst that I have ever seen them. All the coaches have been complaining and the players have complained. We have also had

some injuries on them," said Summers of the courts, scarred by cracks in the surface.

Washington coach Chip Zimmer echoes Summer's complaint, but with respect.

"Of the teams in the Northwest, Oregon probably has the worst courts," said Zimmer. "It is a real disadvantage for us, and the home team is at a definite advantage. But if we come down and lose, we would not make excuses. Players should be able to play on any surfaces."

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SEATTLE — It was a cool, windy, sometimes misty day in Husky Stadium, but the women's track team caught fire and won the last event to pull out a come from behind dual meet victory over Washington, 67-60 on Saturday. The score going into the last event, the mile relay, was Oregon 62-Washington 60, with five points going to the winner and none to the loser — a winner-take-all proposition which the Ducks decided to take.

Oregon's mile relay team qualified for regionals and set a new meet record in the process of winning the meet for the Ducks.

The Ducks' Debbie Adams, a freshman out of Seattle's Roosevelt High School, won and qualified for the regional meet in every event she entered with the exception of the 400 relay, which was disqualified because of a bad baton pass. Adams set a meet record in the 100, beating the old mark of 12.03 by .03 seconds. Adams also won the 200 (24.9) and the long jump (18-8 3/4).

"I could have been faster," said Adams. "The times were good for the weather. I could have run a

Sonics take 101-86 victory over Blazers

SEATTLE (AP) — Gus Williams scored 29 points and ignited a fourth-quarter Seattle rally that buried the world champion Portland Trail Blazers, 101-86, in a National Basketball Association game Sunday.

Seattle led 82-76 early in the fourth quarter before Williams led a 14-4 spurt. He scored eight points as the SuperSonics took a commanding 96-80 lead with 3:02 left in the game.

Bruce Seals came off the bench in the second half to play an important role in the Sonic victory. He scored seven points in the third quarter to rally Seattle from a 47-45 halftime deficit to a 73-68 lead after three periods.

The Sonics are now 44-34 on the season. Lionel Hollins paced Portland with 16 points and Tom Owens, playing for the injured Bill Walton, added 15. The loss dropped Portland to 56-22.

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
