Oregon takes all the spoils, little left for outmanned UW

SEATTLE — The Oregon trackmen, who swept one event and finished 1-2 in seven others, threw the leftovers to Washington and came away with a lopsided 110-53 dual meet win over the Huskies Saturday afternoon.

The Ducks had several stand-out performances, the most notable of which was Rudy Chapa's 13:35.0 run in the 5000 that qualified him for the NCAA meet in June.

Junior Jon Ogard, Oregon's top long jumper, showed his talents by running in the Duck's winning 400 relay team and winning the high jump along with finishing second in the long jump.

Ogard, who hadn't high jumped in competition since his high school days, won the competition with a jump of 6-10 and fewer misses at that height than Oregon's Jan From.

"It was my favorite event in high school," said Ogard "and we needed an extra man. They (the Huskies) have one who has only gone 6-4 and I did 6-7 in high school, so I figured I'd have a chance." Ogard just missed at 7-1/4 which would have tied the school record. Oregon coaches Bill Dellinger and Frank Morris were pleased with their team's performances, Dellinger particularly with Chapa's 5000 run. "Rudy ran one of the finer times (the third fastest) in the world this year," said Dellinger. "Right now he's one of the fastest in the country. Outstanding."

Chapa's run overshadowed an Oregon sweep of the 5000, with

Bill McChesney and Don Clary finishing 2-3, all of whom busted the NCAA qualifying mark of 14:12.0.

Sprinters Andrew Banks and Don Coleman also gave Dellinger something to smile about, finishing 1-2 in the 100 and 1-2 (Coleman-Banks) in the 200.

The Ducks fared well in the hurdles, two events they probably would not have won if Washington's world class hurdler Robert Gaines had run. Gaines injured an ankle playing football spring break. Mike Chriss and Chris Goodwin finished 1-2 in the 100 highs and James Bell and Chriss finished 1-3 in the 400 intermediates to give the Ducks solid performances in those events.

Alberto Salazar ran a lifetime best of 3:48.6 in the 1500, coming from two meters back with 10 meters to go to beat a very surprised Husky, Peter Favell, by a yard at the finish.

In all, the Ducks lost only the 800, steeplechase and mile relay on the track and the hammer and javelin events in the field.

The hammer throw was won by Morris, who had earlier predicted that Husky Jeff Neilson would win. What Morris did not predict was that Neilson would break the collegiate record by throwing 238-8 and beat second place finisher John McArdle by 50 feet.

"It was a beautiful throw," said Morris of Neilson's throw. "Neilson shows tremendous improvement each year. By 1980 he should be one of the top in the world. He has all the tools to be a champion."

Morris said McArdle is not throwing the hammer well right now and will have to work himself out of his slump. "He's a hard worker, he'll come out of it," said Morris.

Washington's only other field event victory came with a 1-2 finish in the javelin by Pac-8 champ Duncan Atwood and Tom Sinclair.

Morris felt his fieldmen competed "super" and complimented Dave Voorhees and Jeff Stover's performances in the shot and Voorhees' in the discus. Stover threw for a personal best of 63-1, good enough for first place and a

trip to the NCAA meet. Voorhees finished fourth in the shot and first in the discus.

"I'm pleased with Voorhees' progress," said Morris. "The knee is getting better all the time. With competition he will gain more confidence."

"The knee felt super — just like the old days," said Voorhees. "My performance was not great, but good enough. There was no pain today. It sure does feel good not to have any pain."

might take awhile, but she'll be ready when it counts."

Stream said that later Adams might be placed in the hurdle event to help strengthen the hurdle crew.

According to Oregon head coach Tom Heinonen, Katy Mountain's wins in the 800 and 1500 were "clutch performances." Mountain set a meet record in the 1500, eclipsing the old mark by 12 seconds.

Mountain said she was hoping to do better in the 800, where she dropped down from the 1500 to cover for Ellen Schmidt, who sat out the meet. Mountain said she's "not one to double" but said she would probably run into 3000

against Seattle Pacific on Saturday.

Heather Tolford set a meet record in the 3000 and ran a personal best of 9:50.5, and qualified for regionals.

Washington won four of the five field events, with Adams jumping to Oregon's only field event victory in the long jump. On the other hand, Oregon won all but two running events, placing 1-2 in two (100,200)

In the 400 hurdles, Georgene Rose set a school record although she finished second. Her 63.5 mark beat the old record of 63.8 and qualified her for the regional meet. Rose also beat her old personal record by nearly a second.

Oregon fell behind early in the meet, staying close until Washington placed 1-2 in both the high jump and 110 hurdles. Oregon then pulled off a 1-2 finish in the 100 with Melanie Batiste finishing behind Adams.

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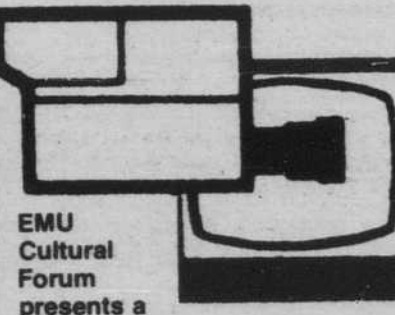
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
