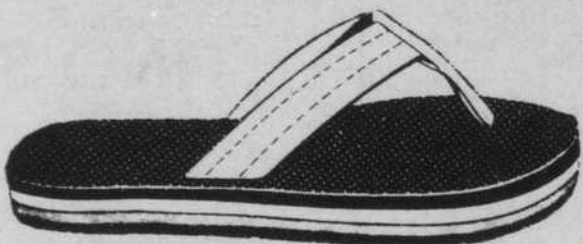

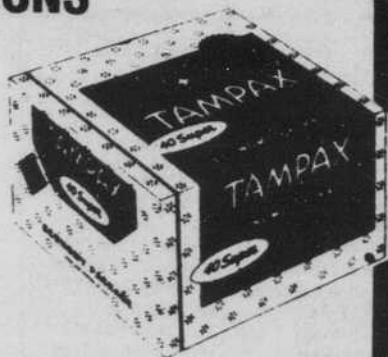

Affirmative votes lead in school bond issue

The "yes" votes were leading by a slim margin Tuesday on the \$5.95 million school bond issue with 128 of 169 precincts reporting at press time.

The bond issue, if passed, will pay for long neglected general maintenance, energy conservation projects and various construction work around school District 4-J.

The predictions for a low-voter turnout proved to be true with less than 20 percent of registered voters going to the polls.

In the Eugene school board race, Maggie Gontrom, with 6,041 votes, was leading Ned Rishbrough, director of Eugene Hearing and Speech Center, by approximately 2,340 votes.

Former radio newsman Guy di Torrice was in third place with 1,436 votes.

In the Position 3 race Jim Jeppeson, an engineer who was appointed to the position in February had 6,302 votes leading Barbara Koser, a grant writer, by 3,273 votes. Rick Paul trailed Jeppeson by 4,548 votes.

Jim Britton led in the four-year term Position 5 race with 5,196 votes, leading Doug McCool by 955 votes. Rosemary Boss was trailing far behind.

In the Lane Community College school board elections Catherine Lauris — with 8,186 votes — led

John Hanks by a 3,444-vote margin for the Zone 5 position, representing residents of the Eugene school districts. Lauris is seeking her third term on the board.

Charlene Curry — with 4,209 votes — had a wide lead over candidates Ronald Farmer, Alan Scott, Jr., and Lawrence Wheeler for Zone 3, representing the Springfield, Marcola and McKenzie school districts.

For the At Large Position, representing the entire school district, Leslie Hendrickson had 5,787 votes leading incumbent Richard Freeman by more than 2,000 votes. Leonard Wassom, and William Watkins trailed.
