Waves not unusual, Tell says

An Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) radiation specialist said Thursday that based on an initial briefing of the disturbing radio signals reported in Eugene, he doesn't expect to "see anything unusual."

Richard Tell, a physicist from the EPA's Las Vegas office, told a Eugene news conference, "I have mixed feelings about what will be

found here. We probably won't be seeing anything unusual."

He said the EPA has been asked "to help solve what appears to be a problem" because radio signals "have been implicated and appear to be causing ill effects and health problems."

"I understand there are a number of individuals in the Eugene area who are affected by physical symptoms, but I don't think anyone knows yet if they're connected to radio signals," he said.

He said the reported symptoms are "a pressure between the temples and a perception of an acoustic signal in the head."

With the help of an electromagnetic radiation analysis van containing a "large amount of sophisticated equipment," Tell said he would analyze the signals to see if there was anything "peculiar or unusual in the nature or intensity of the signals."

He said the Eugene visit was the first time the EPA has been

requested to investigate a specific electromagnetic radiation phenomena. He said the EPA routinely visits cities to analyze electromagnetic radiation as part of their normal testing program.

Tell said the reason the EPA has been examining the level of non-ionizing radiation in different cities is to determine if it is necessary to set standards to limit the amount of radiation.

Commenting on the possible physical effects of radio signals, Tell said, "There is nothing in the literature to suggest any biological effects at this frequency or intensity."

The radiation specialist said the EPA van will conduct tests in the Eugene area for the next three days. He said tests would probably be conducted at the apartment of Marshall Van Ert, the University industrial hygienist who first detected the presence of the signals, and "other locations where individuals say they have perceived the effects."

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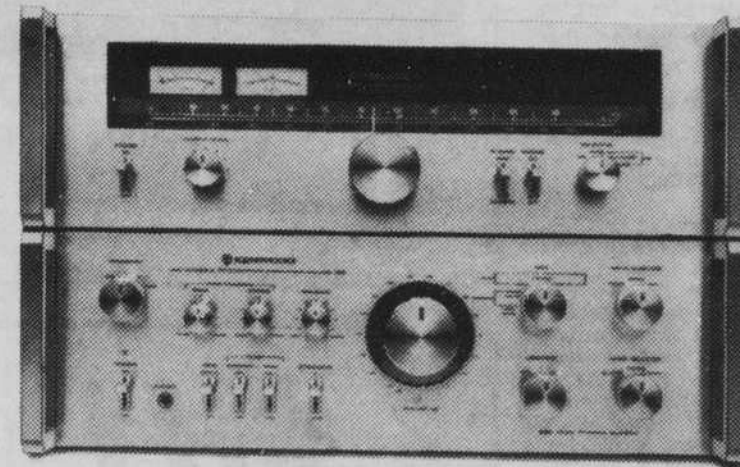
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
