

Burrows appraises ballot measures

State Rep. Mary Burrows, R-Eugene, affirmed her support of four state ballot measures coming up in the May 23 primary election during the weekly meeting of the Republican Roundtable Forum at noon Friday, but said she's undecided about the proposed two-cent gas tax increase.

She discussed each ballot measure, offered her appraisal of them and explained why she supports them.

• Ballot Measure One is a proposed constitutional amendment that would give home rule counties the same initiative and referendum provisions as the state. Lane County is one of five home rule counties in the state.

"People in home rule counties would have 90 days following the adoption of an ordinance to circulate a petition instead of the current 30 days," Burrows said. The number of signatures required for home rule initiative and referendum petitions would be the same as the number of signatures required by the state, she said.

• Ballot Measure Two is a proposed constitutional amendment requiring all joint legislative committees during the session or in-

terim to make their meetings accessible to the public, to post notices of the meetings and to take minutes at the meetings.

"This ballot measure is a response to a lawsuit filed against several legislators . . . who were accused of violating the Open Meetings Law," she says.

• Ballot Measure Three is a proposed bonding measure to finance the construction of rental multi-family housing for low-income elderly persons.

Burrows says it's a "self-supporting" measure because builders could borrow money at low interest rates from the funds created by the bonds, they could build the housing for the elderly and the bonds would be paid off by the loan and rent payments.

Furthermore, the measure could have a positive effect on the economy, related construction and the rental units would increase the area's tax base, Burrows said.

"This measure is widely supported by seniors all over the state."

• Ballot Measure Five is the only measure Burrows has not yet made a decision about. The measure is a proposed gas tax increase from 7 to 9 cents a gallon. The measure would also increase the weight-mile tax on truckers. If accepted, highway revenue is expected to increase by \$37 million a year.

"It requires money obtained from these taxes and vehicle re-

gistration to be used for highway maintenance and reconstruction before they're used for new construction," she explained.

The measure's passage would put into effect a stand-by bill that restricts the amount of highway money available to the parks and police. It also removes bicycle path funding from the highway fund to the general fund.

"Our highways are wearing out and we need the money for repair work," she says, but the gas tax hike is one of many tax increase burdens on the citizen.

Burrows did not comment on the sixth ballot measure except to say that it only affects the Portland urban area. This measure would abolish Portland's council of governments and would replace it with a metropolitan service district.

Burrows, a third-term legislator, also discussed the legislative interim process.

The interim is a time for study and research, Burrows said. She receives 25 to 30 pieces of mail a day such as private and governmental research reports, position papers and letters from her constituents. The constituents who write their legislators are primarily from urban areas, she said.

"Most constituent problems deal with some level of government," she said. "That's a subtle way of saying I think we should look at governmental reform."

Burrows said she believes Oregon legislators try to be ac-

cessible to their constituents and that she appreciates Oregon's legislative process. After having served on national committees

with other legislators, she said, "I am appalled at their process and I'm appalled at their attitudes toward constituents."
