

UN rep to speak in Allen

Calistus Ndlovu, a UN representative from the Patriotic Front of Zimbabwe, will be speaking at the University Friday, at 1 p.m. in 221 Allen Hall.

Ndlovu will be speaking on "Zimbabwe: The Struggle for Liberation and Ian's Smith's 'Settlement.'" The Patriotic Front, which has been engaged in armed struggle against the white-ruled Rhodesian regime for many years, has demanded full majority rule for the nation known as Zimbabwe by African states.

Ndlovu was a political advisor to the Patriotic Front delegation in the Geneva talks in 1976 and 1977 aimed at bringing about a transition to majority rule in the former British colony. Ndlovu is associated with the Zimbabwe African Peoples Union (ZAPU) led by Joshua Nkomo, which has joined in a coalition with the Zimbabwe African National Union (ZANU) led by Robert Mugabe. The two groups are trying to unify their military and political units into a single Patriotic Front.

Ndlovu is also director of African studies and associate professor of history and political science at Hofstra University in New York. His appearance in Eugene is sponsored by People for Southern African Freedom. Ndlovu will also lead a discussion on the support movement for African liberation Friday evening at 8 at 1414 Kincaid St.

Several student recitals are scheduled this week at Beall Concert Hall. Mary Lee Parker will present her doctoral degree composition recital Friday at 8 p.m.

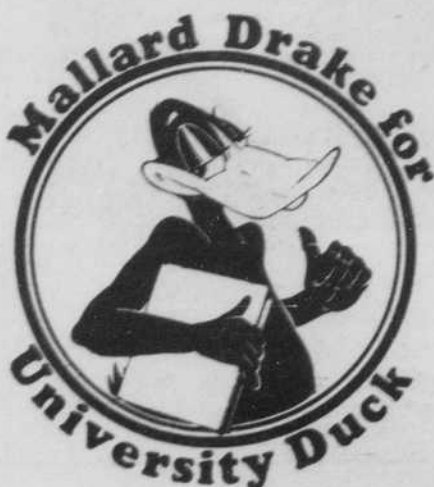
Roberta Russell will give her doctoral degree flute recital Sunday at 3:15 p.m.
