Surprising Ducks stay atop Northern Division

PULLMAN, Wash. — By splitting a pair of weekend games with Washington State, Oregon's baseball team retained its one-game lead in the race for the Northern Division crown.

The Cougars beat Oregon on Friday, 8-3, forcing a tie in the league standings at three wins and one loss each, but the Ducks came back to score a 4-3 victory on Saturday to claim sole possession of first place for the second weekend in a row.

The second game of Saturday's doubleheader was called after 12 innings on account of darkness with the score tied at two apiece.

According to Oregon coach Mel Krause, the game won't be finished or made up unless it's later decided to have an effect on

the outcome of the league standings.

Krause stated that the decision will have to be made by Pac-8 officials sometime before WSU makes its road trip to Eugene on the weekend of April 28. League rules state that ties between non-traditional rivals aren't required to be played out.

"It was a good road trip," said Krause of the two-day stand in Pullman. "The most satisfying thing about it was that I could feel in the dugout the feeling that the guys knew that we could win. And that was before the weekend even started. We haven't had that kind of feeling in a long time."

"I think it started with the Washington series last weekend and then the Portland State game

on Tuesday," he continued. "Coming from behind in all those games really gave the guys a shot in the arm. I think they honestly believe that we can play the kind of ball to win this thing. And we can."

Although Saturday's win was the Duck's first against WSU in two years, the majority of Krause's comments were on the game he didn't get — the tie. Oregon grabbed a 2-0 lead in the seventh inning of that game, but gave up single runs in both the seventh and eighth frames to watch a chance of victory vanish along

with the daylight.

"It's hindsight, but I think that I may have stayed too long with Glenn Fisher," he said. Fisher, Oregon's starting pitcher, gave up only one hit according to Krause, but he also walked 10 batters. His final three free passes before being lifted loaded the bases for the Cougars in the seventh inning and consequently allowed them to pull within one.

"He had good stuff," Krause said. "And on a lot of his walks, he'd have two strikes on the guy and then just lose him."

Pitching, however, was no prob-

lem in the first game of the scheduled twinbill. Freshman Dean Kegler continued his mastery of college hitters, winning his sixth game of the season against no losses.

Women even weekend action with 105-17 beatings of Cougs

The weather may have been dismal, but the Oregon women managed to have some fun despite rain, as they overwhelmed Washington State 105-17 in a dual track meet at Hayward Field Saturday.

Following close meets the past two weeks, Oregon Coach Tom Heinonen loosened up and did a little experimenting, entering many of his athletes in events they haven't participated in yet this year. Oregon thoroughly dominated the Cougars, the only suspense being whether Oregon would score 100 points or not.

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Oregon won every event except the long jump, where versatile Debbie Adams was upset by the Cougars' Eileen Hoffman.

After jumping in the 18 to 19 foot range all year, Adams could manage only a 16-10 1/4, which was good for second behind Hoffman's 17-4. The loss was Adams' first in an individual event

this year.

Patty Kearney, who is making a habit of breaking the school javelin record this year, did it again Saturday. This time she broke the mark she set last week against Seattle Pacific by an incredible 11 feet. Her throw of 154-11 gave her

Ducks bogey in Houston

HOUSTON — Oregon's golf team carded a miserable 17-over par to finish eighth after the final round of the All-American Intercollegiate tournament here.

Oregon stood fifth, sixth, and fifth again respectively after the first three rounds of the 72-hole tournament but were hurt by two 75s, a 77 and a 78 on the tough Atascocita Country Club course.

The biggest drawback for Oregon was the play of All-American Jeff Sanders, who began the tournament with an 81 and whose scores never counted for the Ducks.

The lowest scorers for Oregon were Scott Tuttle and Brent Murray, both of whom finished the event with 292 scores. Doug Hixon had a total of 299, with Jon Hesselwood finishing at 302. Sanders ended with a 304 after firing a 76 on Saturday.

Oklahoma State won the title, beating Georgia by 11 strokes with a 1,134 team score.
