

## History scholar to lecture

Albert Fein, a New York landscape architecture and history scholar who is the author of several books about the history of the environment, will deliver three public lectures this week as part of a campus visit sponsored by the Department of Landscape Architecture.

Fein's first talk, entitled "Frederick Law Olmstead and the American Experience," will be delivered at 4:30 today in Room 177, Lawrence Hall. Fein will discuss "Utopia as Environmental Reform: The Shakers in American History" 3:30 p.m. Tuesday in Room 107, Lawrence Hall, and will deliver a talk entitled "Historic Preservation and Landscape Architecture" 4:30 p.m. Wednesday in Room 107 Lawrence Hall.

All the talks are open, with no charge to the public.

Fein, a visiting professor of landscape architecture at Harvard University and a professor of history and urban studies at Long Island University in New York City, will meet with University landscape architecture students during his week-long campus visit.

Among several environmental history books he has written is "Frederick Law Olmstead and the American Environmental Tradition."

## Architect slates speech on form

A speech on "Figure and Form" Tuesday will be the third spring lecture sponsored by the architecture department.

Alan Coluqhoun will speak at 7:30 p.m. in 107 Lawrence. He is an architect in private practice, as well as a principal lecturer in history of architecture at the Polytechnic of Central London. He is a visiting professor at Princeton University Department of Architecture.

His publications include "Typology and Design Method" and "Displacement of Concepts." His lecture will deal with the linguistic differences between figures and forms.

An illustrated lecture on "The Bronze Age Civilization on the Island of Thera" will be presented Tuesday at 8 p.m. in 123 Science.

Spyros Iakovidis, one of the world's leading Bronze Age archaeologists, promises to give in his lecture "a survey of the research done on Thera, of the civilization uncovered there and of the answers the excavation provides to some of the questions related to the Aegean in the Bronze Age."

The lecture is sponsored by the Assembly and University Lectures Committee, the art history and classics departments and the Eugene Society of the Archaeological Institute of America.
