

Last day to file for graduation extended to Fri.

The list of degree candidates for spring term graduation is being compiled by the registrar's office, and the last day to file for degree has been extended to Friday.

To qualify for degree a student must have completed all necessary work and procedures by the end of the term. All transcripts from other schools necessary for a degree should be sent to the attention of Graduation, Office of the Registrar, in order that it may be on file by the deadline. This includes work taken through the Division of Continuing Education.

Any student who has applied previously and did not receive the degree must reapply. Likewise, any student who does not meet the deadlines must reapply for a future date. The date will be enforced because of the many operations of checking, clearing and printing that must follow the application, according to office personnel.
