

Candidate Atiyeh says don't go for flair

Republican gubernatorial candidate Victor Atiyeh says that if someone votes against him because of something he stands for or says, he can understand that. But what Atiyeh can't understand is if someone cancels his vote for someone with flair.

That man with flair is Tom McCall, ex-governor and a current

gubernatorial candidate. Atiyeh questions McCall's environmentalism saying that what McCall did was to focus national attention on the state of Oregon during his term of office, and in the process, people started moving to Oregon. Atiyeh says that population figures went significantly up during McCall's term of governor.

"What Oregon needs is an environmentalist. We don't need a blabbermouth....," Atiyeh says,

adding that he is an environmentalist.

Three Republican candidates for governor, Atiyeh, McCall and Roger Martin, will participate in an ASUO-sponsored forum Friday at noon in the EMU.

Atiyeh says he would like to add some direction to the management and operation of state government, adding he has extensive experience with state committees from his years as a state senator.

"My first concern is that people get services. Right now they aren't getting them, and I'm totally aggravated about it," he says.

Atiyeh does not support de-commissioning the Trojan nuclear plant and says he will "not stand in the way of Pebble Springs."

He adds that he wants to develop incentives for research to make alternative energy sources possible.

"I don't really want nuclear power as my future," he says.

On the topic of field burning, Atiyeh says he is always looking for alternatives to the current situation. He cites alternate planting years as one alternative he is studying.

Atiyeh has been active in the state senate for the past 19 years and has worked on introducing Oregon's first air and water quality control legislation and has been a leader in land-use planning.

Most programs get desired IFC funding

Things went smoothly Monday night at the Incidental Fee Committee (IFC) granted most ASUO

programs their total requests.

The ASUO executive had a quick hearing. Their \$52,957.29 total was unanimously awarded. The amount reflects a decrease of more than 19 percent. The budget includes the president's office, program administration and finance and state and university affairs.

The Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group (OSPIRG) was given its requested budget total, \$43,000, even though the executive recommendation was for \$38,000. The group does research in environmental, consumer and civil rights fields.

Student University Affairs Board (SUAB) members were also given the amount they asked for, \$12,529.22. This is an increase over last year's budget, but stays within the 5 percent growth limitation.

Both the Student Bar Association (SBA) and the Course Guide were awarded their requests intact. SBA received \$9,476.70 while the Guide received \$9,029.70 and \$2,200 for an ASUO Calendar.

The Hawaii Club netted \$1,500 for their annual luau. Seventy-five percent of the money must be repaid to the IFC from admission charged at the luau.

Language dept. changes name

"East Asian Languages" will appear in the 1978-79 University catalog and next fall's time schedule as the new name for the University's Chinese and Japanese Department.

The name was changed to enhance the recognition of the Chinese and Japanese Department, according to Department Head Michael Fish. The new name will more closely identify the department's program with parallel programs offered at other schools, Fish says.

"The idea is that like a great many other programs around the country, we offer the fundamental courses in Chinese and Japanese," he explains. "We thought that we should try to gain more recognition for what we do."
