Toshiro Mifune is Sanjuro, an unemployed Samurai whose services are available to the highest bidder. "Duck" is Sergio Leone's comedy-satire of force. Humor plays a larger part in this than in other Leone films. Rod Steiger is a Mexican bandit whose offspring constitute his gang — Steiger meets James Coburn, a demolitions expert, and the two unknowingly become revolutionary heroes.
