

History prof. to speak

Prof. Joel Williamson will present "A Scheme to Interpret Race Relations in the South Since the Emancipation" in a 3:30 p.m. lecture at the EMU, room to be posted, today.

Williamson, a professor of history at the University of North Carolina, is best known for his book "After Slavery: The Negro in South Carolina during Reconstruction, 1861-1877." In recent years he has done extensive research on Southern race relations in the segregation era, and now, as a fellow of the center for Advanced Study in the Behavior Sciences at Stanford University, is completing a major work embodying his conclusions.

Williamson will be available at the graduate lounge from 1:30 to 3:15 today to talk with faculty and students.

Brazilian pianist to play

Alimonda is a professor at the Music School of the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro. He has given concerts throughout Brazil and has toured the United States and Europe as well.

Alimonda is a self-taught composer and he has written several pieces for piano. He has also written articles on piano technique.

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Healing method to be discussed

Physical healing by spiritual means alone will be discussed by James Spencer, a Christian Science lecturer from Birmingham, Mich., in a talk Friday at 8 p.m. at the Valley River Inn.

He views Christ Jesus as "the most radically spiritual healer the world has ever known, healing mental illnesses, blood disorders, blindness and deafness, paralysis, congenital lameness and leprosy."
