

Arab students show flick

The Organization of Arab Students (OAS) will show a film on "The Palestine" today at 4 in the EMU room to be posted.

The film depicts the lives of the Palestinian people from the eve of 1948 until the start of the armed struggle. It shows the struggle of the Jewish people against Nazism and the emergence of Zionism and its practices, according to OAS members.

OAS, in conjunction with the Italian Students Association, will also sponsor a Palestinian Solidarity Night Saturday with dinner, songs, poetry and slide show.

The \$2.50 event will take place at the Wesley Center, 1236 Kincaid St., beginning at 8 p.m.

Foreign students honored

Foreign students from Japan and the Netherlands will be honored this weekend at the University.

On Saturday, the flag of Japan will be flown at the EMU to recognize the celebration of the Emperor's Birthday in Japan.

Both displays are part of the University's Flag of Nations project. The project honors foreign students attending the University on the date of national observances in their respective home countries.

Percussion program set

The University Percussion Ensemble will present a concert at Beall Concert Hall Sunday at 8 p.m.

Charles Dwyer, professor of music at the University, will conduct the group in a program of classic and avant-garde percussion music.

The program for the concert will be "Gainsborough" for five percussionists by Thomas Gauger; "Sonatina" for percussion ensemble by Fisher Tull; "Inspirations Diabolique" for solo multiple percussionist by Riekey Tagawa, featuring Robert Kempf as soloist; "Line Drawings" for flute and percussion by Leo Kraft, featuring Robin Russell on flutes and Kempf on multiple percussion; "Incidental Music For Percussion" by Stanley Leonard and "Interlude" by Karel Husa.

In addition, the ensemble will perform two compositions by University Composer James Olsen, "Freneticisms" featuring Olsen on flute and Kevin Super on multiple percussion and "Interjections" which Olsen will conduct.

The 15-member ensemble is known for its performance of many commissioned modern compositions and has performed extensively throughout Oregon.

The concert is free and the public is invited.

Voters must switch soon

Lane County citizens who wish to change their political affiliation for the May 23, Oregon Primary must do so before 5 p.m., Tuesday.

Persons changing their political party affiliation, who have moved since last registering or changed their name, must reregister to vote.

According to Don Penfold, who heads Lane County's General Services Department, voter registration forms are available at approximately 500 public locations in Lane County. These locations include post offices, banks, savings and loan establishments, libraries and most schools throughout the county.

All the voter need do is fill out the registration form, check the party affiliation box, and mail this form in the envelope which accompanies the registration form.

Chem prof garners grant

Richard Noyes, chair of the Department of Chemistry, has received a \$55,000 grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) as continued support for his long-term study of "Oscillating chemical reactions."

Noyes said the basic research has several possible applications, such as helping other researchers learn more about the rhythmic chemical reactions which power living organisms.

The \$55,000 NSF grant is the second installment of a three-year support contract totalling \$173,000.
